"I saw Lyman Rice this morning marching to the docks to embark for the States—the lucky dog. No feeling, it will be a happy day when I get out of this hole."

"I hope that I'll be on my way home by the time you get this and that I can soon be talking to you—but not

in French, for I sure get tired trying to make myself understood."

CHILD WAR WORKERS WON'T GO TO SCHOOL

LONDON, March 29.—(By Mail)—The problem of making premature men and women into children again is proving a hard one.

When the war came boys and girls 14 years old left school to work. There was need for them in many branches of commerce and the children were only too glad to evade their lessons and go out to earn "good money."

Educational authorities are establishing special classes in order to take up the work of teaching these young people at the point where they left off four years ago. But the boys and girls have had a taste of independence and found they could earn

good wages without much learning. They have lost all desire for school and it is impossible to force them to return.
