## U. S. HOLDS FUTURE FOR AIRBOAT TRAVEL

Director of Zeppelin Works Forecasts Internationalization of Air.

BERLIN, April 21.—Flying to America can be done but it will never be a practical means of navigating the oceans, either the Atlantic or the Pacific, according to Ferdinand Raach, director of the Zeppelin works at Staaken. Raach was one of the principal engineers who developed the giant German planes for use in bombing London, planes which would carry several hundred bombs and were three times as large as a "gotha."  
Raach said the Zeppelin people have decided it is not worth while trying to develop air navigation to

America. Planes would have to carry so much fuel that there would be little room for either passengers or baggage. As a mail service, the planes would be useful, but they would not be as fast as the cable, and using them for post would be an expensive matter, unless governments did it.

Internationalize Air  
For shorter distances Raach sees no end of possibilities and the Zeppelin people are preparing to use their works producing a new pease machine. For cross country work there is nothing to compare to aeroplanes, according to Raach, but the air must be internationalized, everywhere, except possibly in America, if air navigation is to be made the most of.  
"European countries are too small to make air service worth while, especially with the huge Zeppelin aeroplanes, says Raach. "The route that planes will be most useful for will be from Berlin to Paris or London, Rome or Constantinople. That is where the great savings in time will count. "Going from one city to another in Germany, for example, will be all right for small planes, but it will not be nearly as big a possibility as the over-

land routes from country to country. To do this successfully, the air must be internationalized, for the benefit of all countries.  
"America is the only country where this will not apply, for all other countries are too small to keep an aeroplane within them. I look for the most remarkable aero development in America, where there are vast areas uncovered by railroads, or where railroads have to go around mountains.  
"Planes can follow routes that will save hundreds of miles and hundreds of hours, both of which will appeal to Americans. In addition, Americans have the energy and capital to develop the air route possibilities, while European concerns are depleted in finances."  
Raach says the Zeppelin people are expecting Americans to take up the Zeppelin engine, and build factories to produce it in America. Dirigibles require a huge big enough to enclose the Vaterland, the world's greatest steamer, and are more subject to wind changes. These factors make the plane the cheapest and most useful for peace work.

Missionary Held Guilty.  
WASHINGTON, April 21.—Eli Mowry, American missionary in Korea, was today sentenced to six months' imprisonment by the Japanese government on a charge of allowing Koreans to use his premises for printing independence propaganda, the state department was advised by Tokio. Mowry was released on bail.

RENO, April 21.—Half of Reno expects Tex Rickard to step up hat in hand and politely ask Reno to stage the Willard-Dempsey fight.  
The other half of Reno either does not want the fight or is dubious about the benefits Reno would receive from it.  
No one here is making it his business to see to it that Rickard considers Reno. The men who naturally would be interested in bringing the fight here, however, take it for granted Reno will stage the fight.  
Manager Saddler of the Golden hotel said he had no doubt the fight would come here. He said reservations for the fight already had been made at the hotel.  
The editor of one of the papers here expressed the opinion of a considerable portion of Reno's population when he said the fight would result in a lot of "left handed" advertising for Reno.  
"It would bring a lot of money here and take a lot away," he said. Reno men are still paying debts resulting from the racing season here.

### U. S. FARM TRACTORS GOING TO EUROPE

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Nearly \$100,000,000 worth of American farm tractors to be shipped abroad this year will:  
Replace war caused man shortage in France and England.  
Give peasant laborers more schooling and socializing influences in the Balkans and Turkey.  
Save camel and buffalo-power in Egypt, Mesopotamia, Greece and other tropical lands where horses are little used in agriculture.  
Increase the crop production in nearly all countries of the world.  
Approximately 99,000 American tractors will be sold for export this year, if last year's export rate is maintained. More than \$14,000 tractors will be manufactured in the U. S. in 1919, according to estimate of the Agricultural Department.

### 30,000 PERSONS IN DETROIT HOMELESS; MAYOR ASKS FUNDS

DETROIT, April 21.—With 30,000 families in Detroit unable to secure sanitary quarters in which to live confronting him, Mayor James Couzens this afternoon asked Corporation Counsel Wilcox to determine whether the state constitution would permit the city to issue bonds to the extent of \$5,000,000 with which to build houses for the homeless. The mayor's office is besieged daily by hundreds of persons unable to rent homes, and he has requested the United States government to send house experts here to help solve the problem.

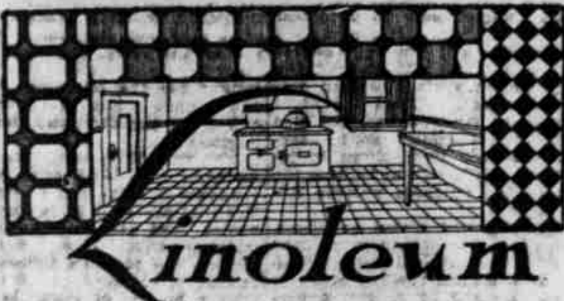
