These conferences are expected to result in a more favorable distribution of funds to this state, the senator says.

To Aid Community Centers.
Edwin T. Reed of the Oregon Agricultural College, has been named director of community center work in Oregon under C. G. Schultz, director of educational extension of the bureau of education at Washington, D. C., according to word received by County Superintendent of Schools W. W. Green. Mr. Reed will assist county superintendents in forwarding community center work in the various counties of the state and will make a call to Umatilla county in the near future. He is highly recommended by J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction for Oregon.

Declamatory Contest Tomorrow.
A declamatory contest will be held tomorrow evening in the high school auditorium between the representatives of the three grade schools of the city to see who will represent the city in the county declamatory contest. The grades of the schools are placed in two divisions, one and two. The sixth, seventh and eighth grades are in the first division, and the third, fourth and fifth grades in the second division. On the second division, the Hawthorne school will be represented by Georgianna Parrazo, the Lincoln by Bobbie Miller, and the Washington by Margaret Rogert.

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, gave a short address to the students and faculty of high school this morning during the period preceding the noon hour. He told of his memory of the first interschool contest the school had engaged in and the friendly rivalry between this school and the Baker high school, during the time he held office as the city superintendent at Baker. He stated that the Baker and Pendleton high schools are very dear to him because of the spirit of friendly rivalry they introduced between the high schools of the eastern part of the state and that their success was really the starting point of the high school system for this part of Oregon.
