man labor as the sole security. Germany must pay a reasonable but not excessive indemnity. France need not fear German militarism as the government can not even defend itself against strikes.

Quick Peace Needed

Nail Assembly Has Control.
The radicals are demanding acceptance of any terms the allies submit but the cabinet now declares that final decision rests with the national assembly, not with the plebiscite. The general opinion prevails that the government deliberately misinterpreted the allied invitation to Versailles, hoping to provoke a crisis that will enable the government to blame the allies if the radicals overthrow the cabinet.

Will Meet Sinn Feiners.
PARIS, April 22.—Lloyd George has agreed to receive an Irish-American delegation next week for discussion of the proposal to allow Edward Devallera and other Sinn Feiners to personally present Ireland's claims for independence before the peace commission. It is announced today.

EXILED NEW YORKER SEES GOTHAM AGAIN

NEW YORK, April 22.—Imagine being an exile from New York city for twenty years and then returning to view for the first time the many changes that have taken place in that period. Such is the experience of John Armstrong Chaloner, poet and farmer, who for the last two decades has been Gotham's most famous exile. During that time he has been legally insane in New York state, but perfectly normal according to the rulings of the courts of Virginia in which state he took refuge after a spectacular escape from a New York asylum. He is now permitted to return under federal protection to appear as witness in his \$100,000 libel suit against a newspaper.

"I think the municipal building and the other great structures that have been erected since I left New York have created a fit setting for the historic old city hall," he said. "New York is certainly the greatest city the world has ever known. Rome in the height of its splendor could not compare to this."

Mr. Chaloner then rode for the first time in a New York subway, which he described as "a delightful place." He compared it to the London tube, and said it was superior in every way. The reason the subway delighted him so much, he explained, was because there was no smoke and plenty of good air.

Mr. Chaloner's original name was Chanler, but he changed the spelling to its ancient form to express his dislike for his living relatives. It was he who originated the famous phrase, "Who's looney now?" that being the telegram he sent his brother, "Sheriff Bob" Chanler, on the occasion of the latter's disastrous marriage to Lina Cavalieri, the opera star.

THRONGS BLOCK PARADE OF VETERANS IN S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—A parade of Argonne veterans down Market street seemed hopelessly blocked at noon Tuesday by a large crowd that refused to move from its path. A call was sent to police headquarters for every available reserve for an attempt to move the crowd, but it appeared that the parade, already three hours late, might not get under way again.

The parade had hardly started at 10 o'clock when Mayor Rolph stopped it to present the colors of the two regiments. This pause was more than the impatient thousands could bear, and they rushed upon the street. Rolph at noon, was marooned on Market street, unable to move from the spot. The soldiers having protected themselves by outposts from the surging crowds, were in many instances shooting craps.

The Red Cross and boy scout units of the parade, with a few floats cut off from the troops by the throng, proceeded down Market street alone. Soldiers tried to make progress down the narrow lane, single file but this attempt was abandoned after several blocks were traversed. Many women fainted.

Japanese Becoming American Citizens

HONOLULU, April 22.—Japanese who served in the United States army here during the war, thus becoming eligible for naturalization, are leaving Hawaii for California and other coast points as soon as they obtain their citizenship papers, according to Richard Halsey, U. S. immigration inspector here. Several scores already have left or have encouraged passage, he said.

To date almost 200 Japanese have been naturalized here. It is estimated that almost 500 were made eligible by military service. Naturalization of Japanese is still proceeding rapidly before Federal Judge H. W. U. S. "Mutineers" Captain Once Editor of Masses

CHICAGO, April 22.—At a national socialist party headquarters, Captain Horatio G. Winslow, commander at Archangel of the Michigan troops of Company I, 339th Infantry, who demanded explanations from their superior officers as to why they were at war with Russia and are reported to have mutinied, is identified as a former member of the socialist party and editor of the socialist magazine, the Masses, previous to the editorship of Max Eastman. Captain Winslow is a son of Chief Justice John E. Winslow of the supreme court of the state of Wisconsin. He is the author of a book on the technique of verse writing. Several short stories from his pen were published in a leading weekly magazine. He was married to a free verse poet, Jane Burr, whose first husband was a member of the Guggenheim family in St. Louis. Friends of Captain Winslow believe that General March's point that the questions which Company I wanted answered were identical with the questions printed on Bolshevik propaganda circulars is not significant.
