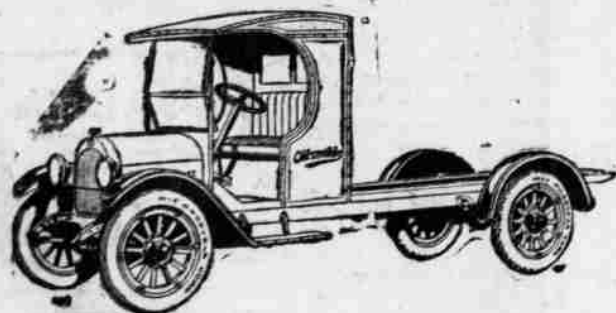

Umatilla is Interested in New Centrifugal Pump

(East Oregonian Special.)

UMATILLA, Oregon, April 29.—W. J. Logan is the first patron on the government project here to install an 8-inch centrifugal pump, having a capacity of eight hundred gallons per minute, for irrigation purposes where the land cannot be reached by the government ditch.

This pump is sufficient for supplying water to several hundred acres. However, it will be used in supplying water over twelve acres of ground. Project Manager Shillin has asked him to keep a record of all costs to demonstrate to other farmers the practicability of the plan. The pump represents an investment of \$600.

J. A. Pryor of Umatilla who has been engaged in the sorghum industry here for the past year, expects to install a mill in this vicinity for handling the sorghum products. A considerable acreage has been put in Umatilla county in the past year, about 700 gallons were turned out last year.

There are about seven acres on the project and this makes the average of 100 gallons to the acre. Mr. Pryor thinks that the acreage will be doubled this year. Thirty-eight acres have been signed up and more coming in.
