**Will Build Garages.**  
Fred S. Seim took out a permit from City Recorder Fitz Gerald today to remodel a barn into a garage. The work will cost \$350. The Episcopal Church also took out a garage permit, to erect a garage for the new auto presented to Rev. Alfred Lockwood. It will cost \$199 and face on Johnson street. Remodeling of a dwelling and woodshed belonging to G. C. Crown at 299 Stonewall Jackson street was proposed in a permit for \$250 worth of work taken out by Mr. Crown.

**Elks Receive Tentative Plans.**  
H. F. Reese, architect representing A. E. Doyle of Portland, submitted several sets of plans for the proposed new Elks' home to the building committee last night and the committee will meet again this evening to study the plans and make suggestions for any changes regarded as feasible. All plans contain provisions for a theater and one set also provides for space for the Pendleton Commercial Association if that body wishes rooms in the new building. The committee will report to the lodge at the regular meeting Thursday night.

**Want Street Sprinkler Out.**  
Owing to delay in starting street sprinkling this spring much hardship is being worked on certain sections of the city with consequent complaints from householders. The worst trouble is in sections where streets not paved are much used by auto traffic. Every passing car raises a cloud of dust. According to Councilman Pendland the subject of sprinkling will be brought up at the council tomorrow. Thus far no contract has been let and the city may follow the plan of hiring the work done without contract as was done last year. Members of the street committee are Claud Pendland, J. H. Estes and F. J. McMenies.

**Review of H. S. Company.**  
A review of the military company of the high school will be held immediately after the Class Day exercises of the graduating class in the near future. According to Holman Perrin, instructor of the company, as much of the work as possible will be given under the command of the sergeants of the company. One sergeant will take the company out upon the field and receive the report, following that will be a short inspection. Then another sergeant will give setting up exercises, followed by competitive drill between the squads, and finally, company drill and the review. As planned at present, Sergeant Koepfen will take the company from the building and receive the report, while Sergeant Smith will conduct the calisthenics. Sergeant Woodworth will take charge of the squad drill, and Sergeant Strahorn of the company drill. In the competitive drill between squads cups will be given to the two best squads. The cups are presented by Mrs. S. A. Lowell and Bond Bros. Both will be of equal value and will be presented to the two best squads, these being chosen from the drill by judges chosen from the business men.

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
