GEN. MARCH HELPED PUBLIC HEAR OF WAR

NEW YORK, April 29.—Gen. Peyton C. March, chief of staff of the U. S. Army, was given great credit today for keeping the war news avenue open to the public, by Marlen E. Pew. Pew was the director of the war department news bureau during the war and has just returned to New York to resume his work as editor of the Editor and Publisher. In his position at Washington he was the chief channel whereby news from the war department reached the public and was in close touch with the entire censorship problem. For years Pew was an active editor of daily papers.
Discussing the censorship Pew said: "Nearly every army officer and newspaper correspondent I have talked with upon their return to Washington from the front have been in agreement as to the evil effects of censorship as affecting the civil population. I vividly recall a conversation with a correspondent of the United Press early last summer upon his return from France, after having visited nearly every sector of the Western front and after four years almost continuous attachment to the armies of both the Central Powers and the Allies."

He had motored from New York to Washington and had inspected the tremendous Army, Navy, and Shipping Board war production enterprises along the seaboard. He told me of his amazement at the scope of these diversified operations and exclaimed: "I would to God that I had landed with men on that trip—Germany's war plans would collapse tomorrow." Subsequent events, of course, proved that the war plans of the Central Powers did not take into account our tremendous scheme of war and that when Germany did understand our military potentialities, through contact with the advance operations of Pershing's forces, she capitulated.
Troop Movements Held.
"The attitude of the War Department has been to conserve the principle of candor with the people upon all obviously of advantage to the enemy and real disadvantage to our war cause. For instance, it was plainly a mistake to publish troop movements overseas while the German U-boat campaign offered a possibility of use of such information, though how, with all our watchful care, such information could leak to the enemy has never been clear to me. However there was a chance in it and no one wished to sponsor such information, the newspapers included.
"The right of the people to know of the conduct of their business at Washington was met with the highest idealism by the Secretary of War. "Much as said of the 'Iron Silence' of military men—their devotion to the principle of secrecy. I have not encountered much of that among the high officials of our army. There is, for instance, no more ardent supporter of open dealing with the people through the press than Peyton C. March, Chief of Staff. He has often said, 'I believe wholly in the right of the people whose army it is to know about their army.' Young officers who through zeal attempted either to apply the press gag or to exploit to press for the disproportionate aggrandizement of their army branches, were easily disabused from the course thru War Department orders.
"As a newspaper man who has been permitted to rather closely view the war operations at Washington it is a matter of the greatest pride that the highest ethics of journalism were met and conserved by the War Department and the army."

Sans Will Admitted to Probate.
The will of the late Amanada B. Sans, who died March 3, was admitted to probate today and John McCoy, John Cochran and John S. Vinson named as appraisers. N. H. Sans was appointed administrator and his undertaking filed.

Fred Paulson has returned after spending nine months in France. He enlisted in the artillery and went overseas immediately for active service.

U. S. FLOUR, CLOTHES SAVING THOUSANDS

BUCHAREST, April 29.—American flour and clothing are saving the lives of thousands of destitute people throughout Roumania. The United States food administration has already brought into the country nearly 20,000 tons of flour, while the American Red Cross, which has a large mission established here, is distributing clothing and general relief supplies of all kinds among the needy population.
Flour from America arrived at a time when conditions were at their worst and when local supplies for the Roumanians people were almost exhausted. It was feared that the want of food would result in a state of bolshevism and revolution. This American flour has been a tremendous factor in preventing the unrest. From its relief stations established at Bucharest, Jassy, Constantza, Galatz, Focsani and Pitesti, the American Red Cross is distributing its supplies, and in every important village an American Red Cross soup kitchen is helping to feed the population.
Queen Marie Interested.
Queen Marie, who has taken the greatest interest in this relief work, has assigned Prince Carol to co-operate with the American Red Cross. Colonel Henry Anderson, Red Cross commissioner to the Balkans, said today that three large consignments of relief supplies had already arrived in Roumania and that the fourth was already on its way from Toulon, so that the American Red Cross would soon be able to care for every destitute person in Roumania.
Roumanians living along the line of the Sereth river, where most of the fighting took place, are in the worst condition. The situation in northern Roumania is reported much less acute. All hospitals are short of supplies, and the American Red Cross is endeavoring to meet their needs. Additional shipments of food, clothing, medicines and soap are being arranged for in France. To provide clothing for the poor, 600 sewing machines and thousands of yards of cloth have been sent into the interior by the American Red Cross commission.
Seeks Ocean Grave.

LOS ANGELES, April 29.—Revealing a sorrowful story of love for a man who is already married, Miss Bennette Pike of 1222 West Jefferson street, daughter of former Judge Bennet Pike of St. Louis, was held by the Venice police on a charge of attempted suicide, following her attempt to drown herself in the ocean off Venice Saturday night. Miss Pike's mother is with her.
According to the young woman's story she undertook to end her life after quarrelling with Edwin S. Bittman of 524 North Alexandria avenue, this city. She told Police Chief Griffith of Venice that she and Bittman spent the early part of the afternoon together.
