## COYOTES DIMINISH UNDER BOUNTY PLAN

### COUNTY PAYS \$739 DURING THIS MONTH

Bounty of \$5 paid for Females, \$3 for Males and Puppies.

Belief that the number of coyotes in Umatilla county is being rapidly diminished is expressed by County Clerk J. T. Brown, who has issued warrants totaling \$739 this month for coyote scalps. This formidable total was amassed by 43 separate returns of pelts, the largest of which numbered 25.

The record for coyote pelts was made in June, 1917, when 1984 was paid in bounties. This represented 328 animals killed in that month as at that time the law provided for a straight bounty of \$3 regardless of size or sex. In 1918 the bounty on females was raised to \$4 and for this year to \$5.

At present grown males are paid for at the rate of \$2 each, females at \$5 each and puppies at \$3 each. The county pays the entire bounty, later certifying to the secretary of state and receiving one-half of the total from the state treasury.

Last month \$584 was paid out in coyote bounties and as March and April are usually the best months for capturing the animals, this month's total is expected to be the highest for the year.

Back in 1911 when but \$1.50 was paid for coyotes, the enormous sum of \$47530 was paid out for 452 scalps. The number of animals taken each year has slightly diminished since that time, giving credence to the belief that these arch enemies of

## Sedative More Powerful Than Morphine Found

TOPEKA, April 29.—A sedative drug more effective than morphine and harmless in its after effects, has long been the object of pharmaceutical experimenters. Dean L. E. Sayre and Laboratory Chief G. N. Watson of the University of Kansas department of pharmacy have, and to a considerable extent believe that they have discovered it in gelsemoline.

The production of gelsemoline was arrived at after years of experimentation with gelsemium, a drug little known to laymen. For a long time Dean Sayre has been regarded as an authority on gelsemium. He and Mr. Watson have succeeded in breaking down gelsemium into three alkaloids and an acid and it is one of these alkaloids that is known as gelsemoline.

"We have used gelsemoline thus far only on frogs, but we have carefully noted its action on their heart, nerve and muscular processes," Dean Sayre said. "We wish to be conservative and not too optimistic, but we feel that gelsemoline may prove of great value to mankind. By the end of the summer we will have completed our investigation and will know definitely what gelsemoline can accomplish."
