Ice Cream is Luxury, So are "Soft Drinks"

After Thursday the federal tax on ice cream and soda fountain drinks

go into effect. The law provides a tax of 1 cent for each 10-cent or fraction thereof of the amount paid to any person conducting a soda fountain, ice cream parlor, or other similar place of business for drinks commonly

known as soft drinks, or for ice cream, ice cream sodas, sundaes or other similar articles of food or drink when sold for consumption at the place of business.

The purchaser must pay the tax to the vendor, who must in turn report to the collector of internal revenue at the end of each month.

DETROIT, May 1.—Picketing was prohibited yesterday at the plant of the Wadsworth Manufacturing Co. by an injunction granted the company following a near riot between strikers and local employees late Monday.

Several hundred men and women were involved in the fight, resulting in scores injured, one seriously.

OLD DIPLOMACY STILL ALIVE IN EUROPE

NEW YORK, May 1.—The American armies won the war against Germany but the victory which the United States wished to gain for civilization has not yet been realized. The past two years have revealed that most of Europe is from Missouri. The Europeans are taking nothing on trust and are willing to admit future wars may be improbable only if they are allowed to prepare for the worst. The two years have introduced America to Europe, but at the same time they have introduced Europe to America, and the surprise is mutual. No longer can Europe refer to America as the land of the almighty dollar, and let it go at that.

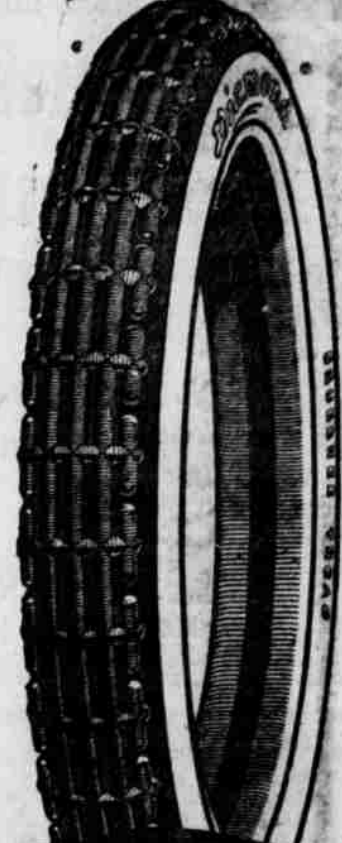
Ideals Discouraged
The profoundest fact of the past two years is the emphasis that has been thrown upon America's idealism. Discouragement if idealists since signing of the armistice terms has not been due to any reaction within the United States, but to a grasping after material spoils which has characterized certain statesmen on the continent of Europe. The two years have witnessed one of the most amazing changes in history as to the attitude of Europe toward the United States. During the critical weeks previous to America's declaration of war, the allies were saying all they wanted was America's moral support. After the United States became a belligerent, Europe pleaded for millions of American troops, and now that the war is over suggestions have been made in Paris and Rome that the war debts be pooled so that the United States shall take over a large part of the financial obligations of the allied nations.

Diplomacy of Loot Lives
America's experience as a world power has demonstrated during the past two years that Europe is more keenly alive to material advantages than the United States ever was. The exhaustion of the European countries accounts for much, but by no means for all of their efforts to get all they can out of the peace treaty. The old diplomacy of loot is far from dead.

This means that events of the past two years and especially the most recent months, have proven that the leadership of the world, if there is to be a new civilization, must pass to America. The European diplomats admit as much when they confess that there can be no League of Nations without the United States. Europe is still the home of quarreling statesmen and of international rivalries. The United States has none of the ferocious incentives to future disputes which are not stilled in Europe. For two years, America's prestige has constantly risen abroad largely for this reason. It is impossible to avoid the conclusion that, hereafter, Europe must turn more and more to America for inspiration and direction in the remaking of the world.

WARSHIPS WAY COME TO PORTLAND DURING ROSE FESTIVAL WEEK

WASHINGTON, May 1.—(Washington Bureau of the Journal.)—The navy department may yet order war vessels to Portland in June for the Rose Festival. Representative McArthur, upon his arrival here Wednesday found awaiting him a letter from Admiral Blue, acting secretary of the navy, saying that in response to the appeal made by members of the naval affairs committee, who recently visited Portland, asking that vessels be sent, the department will endeavor to be represented, but it cannot give a definite promise until the latter part of May. The navy, he says, will be able to give the necessary orders if conditions then permit.
