PEACE WITH HUN BY MAY 21 IS LATEST OUTLOOK

German Credentials Accepted, Delegates Empowered to Represent Entire Country

TREATY COMPLETED, HANDS OF PRINTERS

U. S. Not Directly Concerned in Bulgaria and Turkey Treaties.

(United Press Staff Correspondent) PARIS, May 5.—A secret plenary session of the peace conference will be held tomorrow at which the completed German treaty will be discussed. Latest authoritative information indicates that the treaty will be presented to the Germans Thursday.

Italians Send Message

A Rome dispatch declared the Italian cabinet sent a lengthy note to the allied governments yesterday. The nature of the message is not revealed but it is assumed to be concerned with the reported recognitions between the allied and Italian governments which have apparently been under way since steps were taken for the opening of negotiations with Austria.

Apparently the only thing which has been standing in the way of the Italians' return to the conference is the discovery of a formula which will save Orlando's face with the Italian people and at the same time leave President Wilson and the conference generally in an unaltered position.

Others Simultaneous

The consummation of peace with Bulgaria and Turkey, it is believed, will be undertaken practically simultaneously as the settlement with Austria. The United States will not be directly concerned in either of the treaties as she was not at war with these two countries.

Austrians May 12

BASLE, May 5.—A Vienna dispatch today reported the allies had invited the Austrian peace delegates to come to St. Germain May 12.

FINISH OF 300 BIRD SHOOT TOMORROW
