URGES WORLD LOAN FOR STRICKEN EUROPE

NEW YORK, May 8.—A quick peace, food and work for Europe, and then a world loan enabling those countries bankrupted by the war to rehabilitate themselves—these are the immediate needs of the world today in the opinion of Ralph D. Blumenfeld, editor of the London Daily Express. Blumenfeld, who is one of the most influential British publishers, was born in this country but has lived in England for 27 years, during which time he has been identified with the direction of large journalistic enterprises. His present visit is his first to the United States in fifteen years. "The close of the war found nearly all the belligerents in a state of financial collapse. In four years England spent all of her excess wealth accumulated during 500 years of commerce. France and Italy are financially exhausted. Only the United States and Japan are able to finance reconstruction on their own account," declared Blumenfeld.

"How are these financially broken countries to rehabilitate themselves? There is not money enough in the world to immediately meet the debt under which Europe is staggering. Germany is ruined and cannot at once pay the enormous indemnity though she can and must do so eventually. Besides, to attempt to strip her bare of once would force her into bolshevism and end all chances of her paying anything.

Germany World Tramp.

"So the powers must help Germany."

They must loan her money, not because they pity her or condone her crimes, but because they must loan it if they expect ever to get a large indemnity from her. Germany is the international tramp—a tramp who owes much money but has no food, no business, no job. Before the tramp's creditors can sue for payment, they must provide the tramp with work, time to meet his debts and the opportunity to earn money.

"To raise funds for such an undertaking, a world loan seems essential. This would be for about twenty-five billion dollars. Let us say England takes 20 per cent, the United States 20 per cent, France, Italy and Germany large shares and the other powers smaller amounts.

Give "Work and Hope."
"This money put into a central fund administered by the league of nations, could be loaned to various powers to enable them to pay their debts and to finance their reconstruction. It would also make it possible to provide funds to Germany to put her on her feet and enable her to pay her just debt to the world. Such loans as were made from the central fund for reconstruction work in any country—new railroads, new industrial plants and the like—would always be secured by this newly created physical property until such time as the country involved could pay back the loan and redeem the property.

"Such a plan would give the stricken countries of the world—even the enemy countries—work and hope. The two greatest factors in setting up their self-respect."

War Increases Feeling.

Blumenfeld declared that the war had measurably increased the good feeling in Great Britain towards the United States.

"No single factor contributed more

to that result than the splendid conduct of the American soldier in England," he said. "The recent trouble between the police and American soldiers in London was due principally to the stupidity of a London policeman. The conduct of the Yankee soldiers was consistently beyond reproach.

The feeling in many quarters in England that Germany must be helped does not mean that bitterness against the Germans has abated, Blumenfeld said.

"That feeling was almost wholly the result of the Gotha raids on London," said he. "Britons almost admired the efficiency as fighters of the German soldiers early in the war. They had not then the bitterness of personal feeling against the enemy that developed hatred. Then came the use of poison gas by the Germans and the feeling of hatred began. It was stimulated by the appearance of the Zeppelins over England, but it burst into full flame when the Gothas appeared in fleets and began to shower bombs upon the helpless air of London.
