## THIR BRANDIT UNTAKEN.

boarded the eastbound train. The agent at Bonneville and other railroad officials notified Sheriff Christman and Chief Gibbons, and when the train arrived, the two officers were at the station.

Primrose and Lewis stepped from the train and were placed under arrest. They offered no resistance. With Chief Gibbons on one side and Sheriff Christman on the other, the party started for the county jail. A hundred yards from the depot, Primrose's hand shot to his pocket and before Gibbons could defend himself, the bandit had fired. Firing a second shot, the pair broke and separated running with pistols in their hands through the heart of the business section of the city.

Near the city hall Primrose took refuge in a small clump of ornamental bushes. He was dragged from his hiding place by Sheriff Christman. Citizens, threatening a lynching in revenge for the murder of Gibbons, were held off by the sheriff's pistol. Primrose was safely landed in jail. About two hours later a party of searchers discovered the older Lewis, covered by a mattress, in the basement of the home of Circuit Judge Fred Wilson. All the fight was gone from the bandit when the searchers drew him from his hiding place, and he was taken to the jail, begging piteously for mercy. Both confessed to their crimes Wednesday afternoon. It was stated, and both will face murder charges in this country.
