The Pendleton Iron Works was issued a permit today to build a garage on its premises. The structure will cost \$150, be completed by June 1 and will be built by J. E. Earl.

Would Sell Personal Property.
Petition to sell \$2243.70 worth of personal property belonging to the estate of Omar J. Olinger was filed and granted to D. W. Olinger, administrator, today. The report says that the correct total value of the estate should be \$5,975.50, instead of \$4002.60 as first reported.

Was in Whitman Massacre.
Mrs. Nancy Jacobs of Portland, who is a guest at the home of her girlhood friend, Mrs. William Hakeley, was in the Whitman massacre. Mrs. Jacobs, who is 79 years of age, was a small child at the time of the massacre. Her maiden name was Miss Nancy Osborne.

Remanded to Juvenile Court.
Miss Isabel Ross, arrested Saturday night for exceeding the speed limit, pleaded guilty to the charge in police court Monday afternoon and was remanded to the juvenile court for sentence. She is 16 years of age and therefore cannot be sentenced by the police judge.

Looking For Charles Trotter.
Mrs. Jennette Trotter, of 758 Santa Clara, street, Alameda, California, is searching for her son, Charles D. Trotter, formerly of Pendleton and Pilot Rock. Mrs. Trotter says that her son went to Idaho from this county but later wrote her that he was in Yakima. She has written to both Yakima and Pilot Rock, but her letters have always been returned.

2d Oregon to Have Reunion.
The 2d Oregon, famous after service in the Spanish-American war, will have a reunion of all its officers May 24, in Portland at Hotel Benson, and George A. Hartman, who served as a lieutenant in the 2d Oregon, is planning to attend. There are between 50 and 60 officers scattered over the northwest and Mr. Hartman is the only one from Pendleton.

Will Meet Tom Murphy.
Miss Jane Murphy arrived this morning from Eugene, where she has been attending University of Oregon and joined her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Murphy, Miss Edna Murphy and Mrs. Agnes Christensen. The party left on No. 6 for La Grande, where they will meet Tom Murphy, who has been in France as a member of the La Grande hospital unit, part of the Rainbow division. Tom will arrive tomorrow and it is expected that he will remain 12 hours in La Grande, but it is not probable that the train will stop here.

Men in Casual Company Here.
Ninety members of a Camp Bevensen casual company, mostly members of the headquarters company of the first army corps, arrived in Pendleton on additional cars added to No. 19 and were given breakfast at the Red Cross canteen. The men are from Oregon and Washington and are under the command of Lieutenant George King, 150th Machine Gun Battalion. All are overseas men.

New Fire Apparatus Received.
The new universal joint, nozzle, which permits efficient fighting of basement fires, has been received by the fire department and will complete the modern fire fighting apparatus of the department. It was one of such nozzles which did very effective work in the People's Warehouse fire last winter. The other new equipment received is a scaling ladder which will be used in second and third story fires. It is to be tried out on the volunteer firemen in a series of practice events to be staged shortly.

May Get French Service.
A new opportunity for discharged soldiers and Marines is contained in word received Monday at the local Marine recruiting office, announcing that they may re-enlist in the Marine Corps and will be sent to France until next fall, to relieve men now on duty overseas. In the fall, all troops will be withdrawn and will be discharged upon their return to the United States. Applicants must be physically qualified and only discharged soldiers and Marines will be accepted. The enlistment will be for four years, but notation will be made on enlistment papers and service record book that the applicants are for special limited service in France and will be discharged upon return to the states.

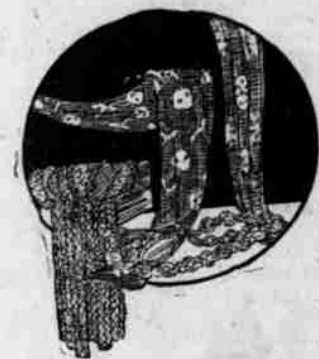
