ed concrete faced with brick and stone. The size of the addition will be 106 feet by 48 feet, and will be for the exclusive use of the pupils.

The first floor will contain four class rooms with cloak rooms, library and harp room; the second floor will contain four class rooms with cloak rooms, laboratory, commercial room and seven music rooms; the third floor will contain dormitories, private rooms and lavatories; the basement will contain dining rooms and store rooms. The addition will be finished by September.

While superintending the work on the academy, Mr. Ballargeon will complete the plans for the new wings for St. Anthony's Hospital. He has had extensive experience in hospital building, the latest in this line being the Providence Hospital in Seattle, costing \$1,000,000 and St. Joseph's Hospital in Tacoma, costing over \$400,000.

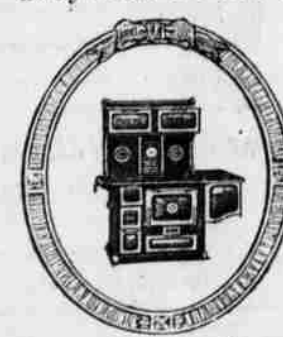

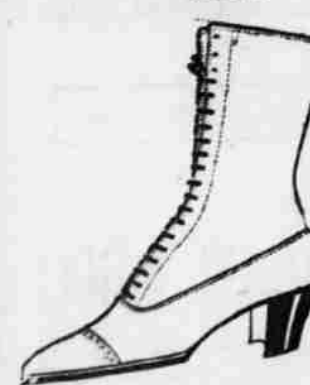
