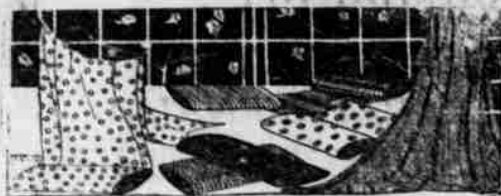

ECHO, May 16.—There will be a dance at the city hall Friday evening. The Echo orchestra will furnish the music.

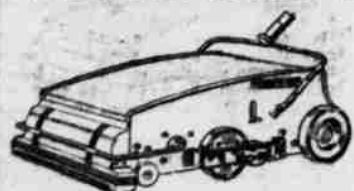
