FAMOUS HORSES ARE SACRIFICED AT MARS

Millionaire U. S. Horseman Recounts Loss With Emotion.

LONDON, May 28.—How the famous Surrenden park stud of show horses was sacrificed on the altar of the god Mars was told with considerable emotion by Walter Winans, millionaire horseman and revolver expert. Winans, who is the son of William Winans of Baltimore, Md., is wealthy enough to be cosmopolitan and has spent many years rounding up prize horses in England, Russia, Belgium and elsewhere.

"I had 40 horses the finest in the world—not because I say they were, but in the opinion of the world's best judges who had awarded them the highest prizes at Olympia and other

international horse shows.

"And they have all died in the war! They were a priceless collection I could have obtained any sum I cared to ask for them. But the war office came along and took them, paying their standard allowances of \$200 apiece for them. Any one of these would have realized for more than the British war office paid for the whole stud.

"My own steed, a champion, Blue Moon, was fed up in the open without a rug and died next day with pneumonia. Marmion, a beautiful animal, who won the international high jump at Olympia, London, Knockalong, who also won many of the jumping prizes, and Vendetta, also a famous jumper, went to Russia just before the war broke out, where Vendetta won the czar's jumping prize. Captain Berren, who used to ride for me, and later was made a general in the Russian army, was forced to ride Vendetta so hard during one of the early battles on the Russian front that it fell down dead.

"The Bolsheviks got hold of Knockalong and sold him about Petrograd without food, until he died of hunger in the streets. Marmion was in the hands of the Bolsheviks when I heard and is probably dead. I would not have taken \$200,000 for any one of these three. Each is irreplaceable.

"My three Russian troika horses, also prize-winners, went to France and died there. Then there was Crocker's Roadster, known all over the world. A famous horse breeder once offered me a blank check for him and I said, 'He's not for sale.' The war office gave me \$200 and he went to France and perished.

"The horse that won so many first prizes in the pace and action classes, Bonnie View, was equally unlucky. It was in the Surrenden Park stud when the Germans tried to bomb Ashford Junction. A bomb dropped near its stall and Bonnie View jumped backwards with fright and broke its spine and died.

"Winans is starting to reform his replacing his Russian and Belgian stud, but he is not very hopeful about breeds. 'I have 15 horses left,' he says. 'They were too young for inclusion in the great war office sweep that was made at the beginning of the war.'

Legislation is Asked By Labor Department

WASHINGTON, May 29.—With only 20 states collecting complete vital statistics, Labor Department and census officials plan to ask the next congress for national machinery to record such facts, particularly births and deaths.

The war has shown the great need of complete national statistics along this line, officials say, and in this respect the United States is far behind European countries. The greatest present need is the complete registration of births, as most states now make registration of all deaths compulsory. The only national registration of births is through the bureau of the census, which accepts the state figures in states where at least 90 per cent of the births are recorded. Less than twenty states and the District of Columbia come under this classification.

During the war officials often asked for statistics of this sort, but few were available. Complete birth records in years past would have made possible the detection of several thousand and shakers, who being near the age limits escaped service by false statements as to their ages. It is stated by the Provost Marshal General's office. Others were unable to prove citizenship through the incomplete records. Meanwhile the children's bureau of the department of labor is urging that the present state registration machinery be made more effective. Cities also are being urged to keep complete records, and birth registration cards are now being sent out.

PLANS TO SOLVE HOUSING PROBLEM

DETROIT, Mich., May 29.—Dreams of owning his own little home—heretofore largely a dream to the workman—are about to become a reality.

What is regarded as possibly the greatest step in solving a big economic question and along with it an ideal for large manufacturers and financiers of the country to follow in combating a grave housing situation in every big community, has been advanced by Henry Ford.

Workingmen at the Ford plant in Dearborn will be able to purchase their own home, live in comfort and no longer will have to commute between the city and plant, under a new housing plan designed for Ford workmen.

To build a home which the worker could afford was the first problem and officials of the Ford Plant, with the assistance of real estate men, apparently have solved the question. Building of uniform houses in large numbers would save much expense in construction, lower the cost to the workmen and further would bring about the quickest relief to the present home shortage situation.

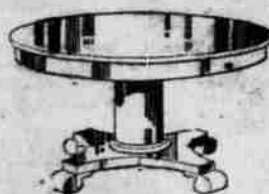

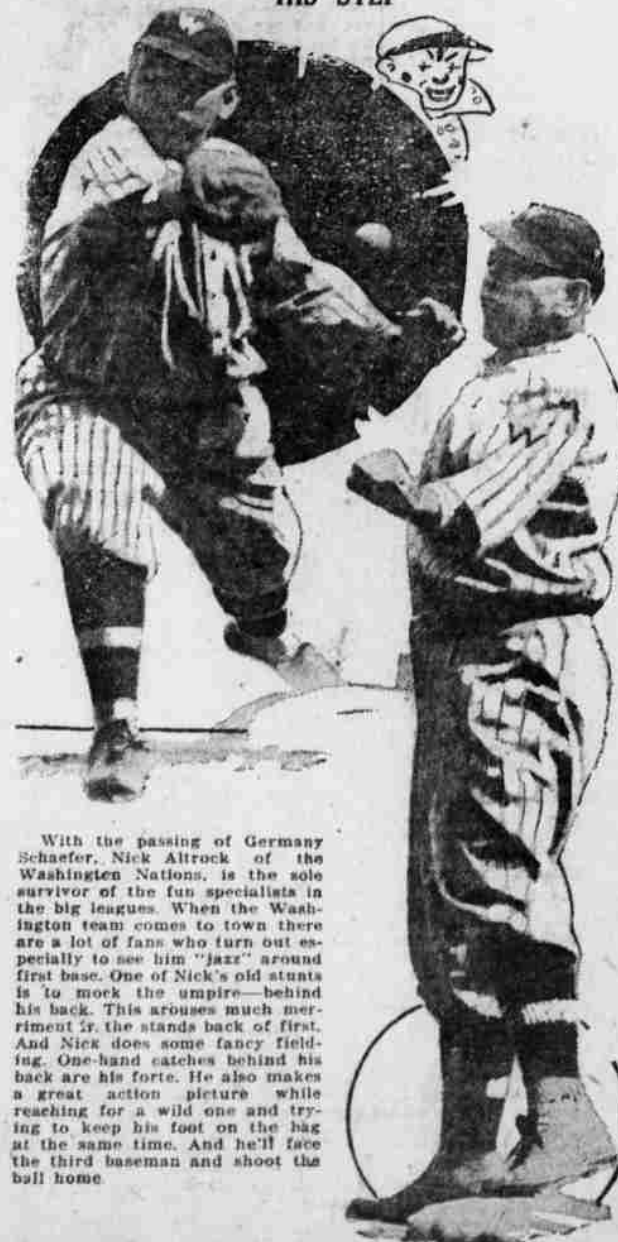
