

# NEWS NOTES OF PENDLETON

**Post Office Will Be Open One Hour.**  
The local post office will be open tomorrow for one hour only, from 9 a. m. to 10 a. m., because of the legal holiday, Decoration Day.

**Canteen Is Painted.**  
The Red Cross canteen at the O. W. R. & N. depot received a final coat of paint yesterday. The building is yellow with brown trimmings. Repainting of the counter will complete the finishing touches on the building.

**Appropriate Window Display.**  
Appropriate for the fishing season is the window display at Allen and Knights, which shows a miniature fisherman who has cast his line into a pool of water. Real fish are to be placed in the pool from time to time.

**Sturtevant Decision Altered.**  
The decree of the circuit court in the famous Sturtevant will contest was altered by Judge G. W. Phelps today to conform with the adverse decision of the supreme court, handed down May 29.

**Alfalfa Cutting Has Begun.**  
The first crop of alfalfa hay is being cut in the alfalfa districts of the county, according to word reaching Pendleton today. At Umatilla farmers are mowing and several have sold their crop in the field for \$12 a ton. At Umatilla and on the west end project alfalfa cutting is also under way.

**Would Condemn School Land.**  
Petitions signed by voters in Union High School District No. 2, asking for condemnation proceedings for their school site, were filed with the district boundary board today and they will meet tomorrow morning to act. The district is at Pilot Rock and the site desired was chosen by an election there last week. A new building will be erected on the site, which is on the Sturtevant estate.

**Bring Back Fine Catch.**  
With 69 fine trout caught after the hardest fishing they have ever experienced, Sol Baum and W. N. Matlock returned Tuesday night from Maupin, on the Deschutes. All the fish were taken with dry flies and the local anglers got ten trout where others were getting but one. The fishing was done in a canyon, with fairly deep water and both advise against novices going to Maupin for trout, although the expert can get a nice basketfull in reasonable time.

**No Grain Disease in County.**  
Rust, wheat rot disease or other damaging attacks on wheat are unknown this season in Umatilla county, according to wheat growers, who have heard words of a spread of the "take-all" disease in southeastern Washington fields. So far grain has shown a healthy state and only frost has done damage so far. Grain heading in most sections and is looking well, although many farmers are asking for moisture.

\* Prepared by cartographers of the peace congress and issued by the United States Committee on Public Information, this map, which anticipates the action of the peace congress on boundaries in eastern and southern Europe, leaves unsettled the Polish-Lithuanian boundary and that between Austria and Hungary and shows the Treaty of London line on the Dalmatian coast. It creates a Constantinople state and throws a bit of Rumania back into Bulgaria, a bit of European Turkey and Bulgaria and a corner of Albania into Greece extending the Albanian frontier a little to the north and east. Greece is also given a bit of the coast of Anatolia.

**New School Books This Year.**  
Nineteen nineteen is the year in which the text books for grammar and high schools change and by the middle of June the State Text Book Commission will have adopted the new books, or re-adopted the old texts. It is rumored that the histories will probably not be changed. Among the members of the commission now busily engaged in Portland in going over the offerings from over a thousand publishers, with a view to selecting the texts, is Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, of La Grande, county school superintendent for Union county. According to the state law, a selection of texts must be made every six years.
