PORTLAND, June 5.—Eleven carloads of livestock entered the North Portland yards over night, but three or four went direct to killers and did not enter the market at all. These direct shipments consisted of cattle, and formed practically the only arrivals for the day in that division. faults in child diet, child specialists tell us is too much sugar. When sugar rations were a wartime necessity children undoubtedly fared better and the fact that candy is still very expensive is no doubt a good thing for them. Sugar, of course, should have a place in the child's diet, but it should never be used in place of other food. The child's stomach is not adapted to digesting this particular form of highly concentrated food.

The child's diet should be made satisfying as well as nourishing, so satisfying that the child will not crave sugar or any other food that it ought not to have.

A sweet dessert, such as apple sauce, custard, baked apple or rennet, can be safely given to a very young child. But a very little sugar on the child's cereal should be enough. If it is given a little weak cocoa, too, should be only slightly sweetened. Don't begin to sprinkle the sugar on the cereal more and more generously, for, although a child does like sugar it is your fault if the child gets a craving for sweets. The eating of sugar is largely a matter of habit and can best be avoided by giving him a little sugar, just enough to satisfy his desire for it, but not enough to form a habit of eating it in large quantities.
