Service Men Fed Here in May.
Two thousand four hundred eighty two men were served during the month of May at the Red Cross canteen, according to a report made by Mrs. S. R. Thompson, head of the canteen committee. Of this number 2359 were soldiers, 109 sailors and 14 United States Marines. The cost for the entire number was \$436.30. The number of men fed last month exceeded the number fed in April, which was 2029. In March the total was 2128 and in February 2523.

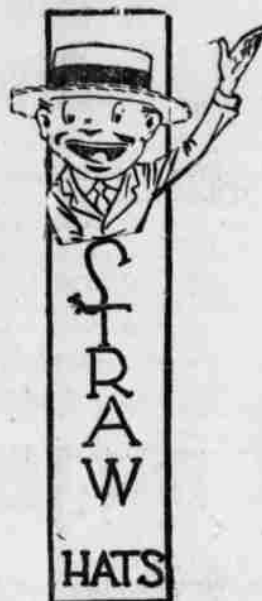

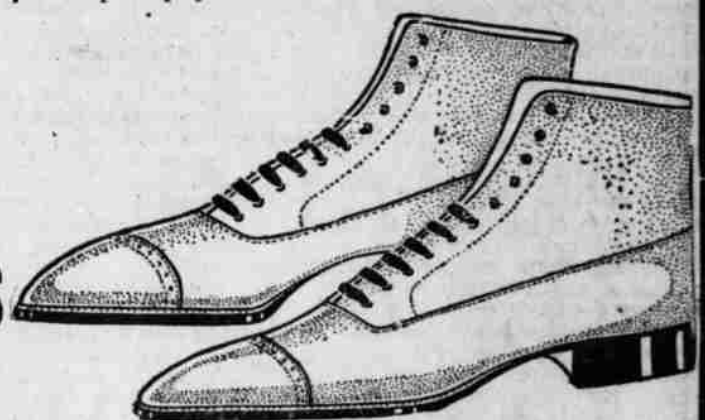
