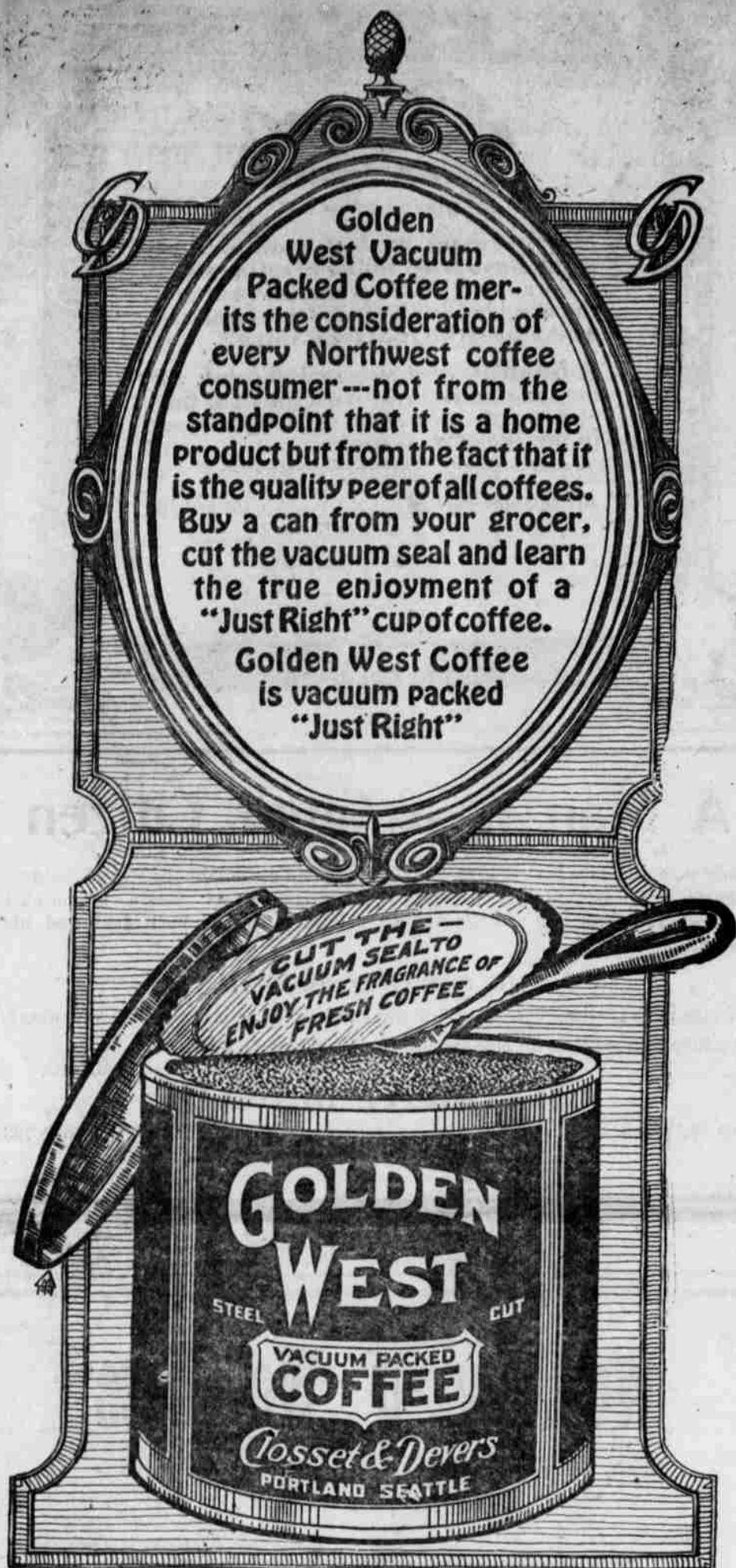

GERMAN DRESS GRATES ON FASTIDIOUS FRENCH

Ladies Who Accompany Peace Party Vastly Differ From Parisiennes

PARIS, June 6.—It's a pretty picture a French writer paints of German peace delegation and the women who accompany them.

"There they were coming out from their luncheon, red-checked and smiling, their chainmail shining pink; mightily pleased with themselves and with their meal, quite unconscious of their part as representatives of an aggressive and defeated country. They found an ungainly crowd, dressed in loose, badly cut clothes, where the glaring blues and the faded greens fought a sorry battle with red ties and yellow boots. A veritable orgy of bad taste."

"I cannot help thinking of one little hat, flat in shape and a dirty white color, over a square face with gold-rimmed glasses, and another large brown felt tipped over one of its wearers ears and accompanied by a romantic green cloak lined with red, which could have made the fortune of a Little Tich. Their possessors, however, were so proud of them, they posed courageously in front of all the cameras, either of the journalists or of the curious. They even took photographs of each other, grouped with their hands on their hips and with an air of self-satisfaction and delight. These will be souvenirs to leave to their grandchildren: 'Peace of Versailles, 1919' Germans are indeed thick-skinned!"

"As for the women, everyone with whom I have discussed them says: 'I have heard there are a few pretty ones, but I have not seen them.' Neither have I. All those I met had the heavy figure, ungainly gait, and square feet of the typical Gretchen. One of them wore pale blue thick cotton stockings and flat-heeled yellow shoes. A few have fresh complexions and light golden hair, but the hair is drawn back tightly from the forehead, and knotted plainly under their hats, which are weighted with various queer and polychrome ornaments—flowers, feathers and ribbons."

"In the park, so proud and beautiful in its loneliness, with its dove-colored waters gleaming thru the pale green arches of its avenues, I noticed thru the gratings two Germans running for exercise around the Fountain of Neptune. Quite right, is it not? But they were running as if for life, their heads foremost, fists clenched, teeth set, eyes goggling out, business-like and terrible. No more the fat, debonair tourist, but the savage Hun."

Cowboy is fastidious Dresser; Saddle is His Luxurious Home

DENVER, June 6.—There is an establishment that deals exclusively with stockmen and cowboys, where a hat costs from \$12 to 20 and a pair of trousers from \$15 to a figure that would stagger even the fastidious. The cowboy's finery is most expensive and he can spend a sum on his outfit that seems out of all proportion to his station in life.

Several skilled workmen spend weeks in making a saddle, mounting it with as much silver and other valuable metals as the purchaser may demand. It sometimes happens that the cowboy's saddle costs more than the horse under it. Regular stock saddles not made to order, cost as high as \$75. If the prospective purchaser wishes to "go in for something fancy" there is practically no limit to the price he may pay.

There are fifty pounds of leather in a "real cowboy saddle," fifty pounds of leather wonderfully carved, stamped and befringed. There are more rings than layman could count without trying to learn their various uses. It has been said that a cowboy's saddle is a "dwelling wherein he eats, works, sleeps and loafs."

A good cowboy pair of spurs can be had for \$15, but, of course, it is not contended that they represent anything more than a rough and ready article for heavy road work. A silver spur, such as would "set off" a stamped patent leather boot with a "monogram," comes much higher. In making an estimate on a complete outfit it would be safe to put down the cowboy's spurs at \$40.

"Chaps" are the wide affairs that go on like a pair of overalls. Sometimes they are of leather, with long fringes, but if the rider is particularly fastidious a pair of chaps of material with the hair unbarbered, chaps cost anywhere from \$15 to \$25.

A hat can be made a wonderful thing when price is not a discouraging consideration. Of hand stamped leather with silver filigree and buckle it can be made to weigh several pounds and to cost several dollars a pound. It has been said that no cowboy would deem himself well dressed without at least five pounds of hat.

WOMAN DISCOVERS GOLD NUGGET IN CHICK'S GIZZARD

TEXAS TO PRODUCE MONSTER WHEAT CROP THIS YEAR

DALLAS, Tex., June 6.—The 2,000,000 acres of Texas land sown in wheat last autumn are expected to produce a crop of 40,000,000 bushels, five times larger than any previous Texas wheat crop. The Texas growers, guaranteed a price of \$2.25 a bushel, figure a total return of \$90,000,000 in round figures, with a \$10,000,000 reduction as the approximate cost of production.

Districts of west Texas and the Pan-

handle belt are recruiting a huge army for harvesting the crop within the next sixty days. For the first time in three years the drought-stricken sections of west Texas have use for reapers.

The reapers have already started on the southern edge of the grain belt and will continue moving north, county by county and state by state, until they reach Canada next fall.

Many districts never before used for growing wheat were sown last fall, including tracts that formerly grew cotton.

Contempt Charge May Jail Lindsey

DENVER, June 6.—"I will go to jail before I will pay that fine! Any time the sheriff gets ready he can come and get me and lock me up! I know I am right and that the fine imposed upon me is unjust!"

Ben B. Lindsey, judge of Denver's juvenile court, made this announcement when he was informed that the supreme court had denied his petition for a rehearing on the contempt charge of which he had been found guilty by John A. Perry, then judge of the criminal court, during the trial of Mrs. Bertha M. Wright.

In April the supreme court decided that Judge Lindsey had acted in contempt of Judge Perry when he refused to answer certain questions put to him on the witness stand during Mrs. Wright's trial, and upheld a \$500 fine imposed by Judge Perry. It is this fine which Judge Lindsey says he will not pay.

Should he persist in his refusal—and he insists he means what he says—the world may witness the spectacle of seeing a judge of a court of record and a man known the world over as one of its greatest philanthropists and humanitarians, behind the bars of a jail cell.

Judge Lindsey was summoned as a witness during the trial of Mrs. Wright to tell the jury what he had learned about the murder of Neal Wright, the defendant's 14-year-old son, and the only eye witness to the killing.

KING ALBERT IS EXPECTED IN AMERICA IN OCTOBER

PARIS, June 6.—King Albert of Belgium is expected to visit Washington to attend the initial meeting of the League of Nations next October.

CHICAGO, June 6.—When Miss Lillian Paustentbach, 20 years old, of Hobbsford, Wis., daughter of the village postmaster, was suspected of having a knowledge of a discrepancy of 25 cents, which a person receiving a letter had found, she left her home according to the father, Joseph Paustentbach. This was seven months ago, the father said, when he asked Chief of detectives James L. Mooney of the detective bureau in Chicago to search for her today.

The young woman, he learned later he said, went to Elgin and entered a hospital there to study nursing. The father last heard from her last Wednesday, when she wrote him from Chicago.

She is described by him as beautiful, blond and blue-eyed. She is about 5 feet 7 inches in height and weighs about 150 pounds. She walks with a slight limp due to an accident some years ago.

The cause of her home leaving was later cleared up, vindicating the girl.

Girls Favor Uniform Dress

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 6.—The girls of the San Diego high school today voted 376 to 336 in favor of a uniform dress. Whether the present muddy bloomers will be retained will be decided later this week. The girls will ask that the sewing rooms of the school be opened three times before school opens next fall that girls may make their uniforms there. Gingham dresses are favored by many of the girls' students.

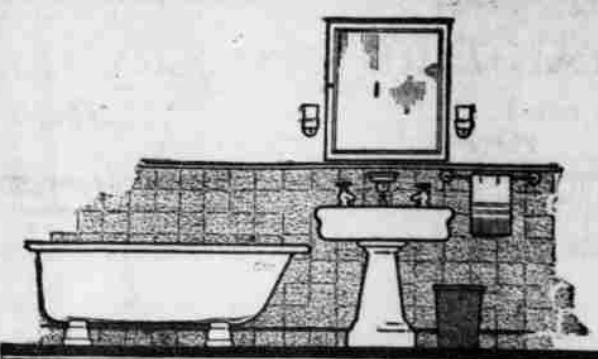
