To Fix Grading Fees.

The Oregon public service commission is to hold an investigation in Portland June 12 for the purpose of fixing fees for inspecting, grading and weighing grain, hay, grain and hay products, potatoes and onions and fixing and establishing standard Oregon grades for oats in conformity with the standards fixed and established by the department of agriculture.

Umatilla County Banks to Get State Funds.

The American National Bank and the First National Bank of Pendleton, the First Bank of Pilot Rock, and the Farmers Bank of Weston, are among the 149 Oregon banks designated by State Treasurer O. P. Hoff as state depositories. The United States National Bank of Salem is named as active depository for state funds. The law requires that one active depository be maintained in Salem.

Treasurer Has Biggest Month.

Nearly \$1,500,000 passed through the hands of Miss Grace A. Gilliam, county treasurer, in May, the largest month financially that the county has ever experienced. Her report, filed with County Clerk R. T. Brown today shows that the cash on hand balance on May 31 was \$924,749.99. The big total is due to the recent rate of the \$725,000 in road bonds, which, with premium and interest, totaled more than \$750,000 alone.

Snooker Table Arrives.

A snooker pool table, said to be the only one in Eastern Oregon, arrived today for Sherman Bros. and is being set up in their new Cozy billiard parlors this afternoon. Snooker is an English game played on a table several feet larger than the ordinary pool table, the balls are smaller and pockets more difficult to hit. The table is expected to be ready for use tonight.

Pendleton Pool Far-Pamed.

From Leavenworth, Kansas, came an inquiry today regarding Pendleton's municipal swimming pool and how it was brought about. The letter was addressed to City Recorder Thomas Pitts-Gerald, who took considerable pride in replying, with all the details. The Associated Boy Scouts of the Kansas city are gathering data to present with a petition to the city council and Pendleton's successful pool is to help them carry their argument.

Spokane-Pendleton Route Good.

The least desirable roads between Spokane and Pendleton are the unpaved stretches from Walla Walla this way, according to J. A. Daisiel, of Spokane, one of the Ad Clubbers driving to Portland for the convention next week. The highway is excellent for ordinary driving all the way and the entire distance might easily be covered in a day. Near Pomeroy large rocks on the road slowed down progress and chewed up tires, Mr. Daisiel said.

Waive Hearing, Await Grand Jury.

John C. Zoller, James Snyder and Etta Snyder, charged with taking away a girl under 14 without the consent of her parents, yesterday waived a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace Joe M. Parkes and were bound over to the September grand jury. Zoller, who married the 14-year-old Katy Thurston, of North Fork, still declares that she is of age, while her father, Frank Thurston, maintains she is but 14. The girl's mother is not living. A charge of carrying a concealed weapon has also been made against Snyder.
