WINNIPEG RESISTANCE DECLARED CRUMBLING

WINNIPEG, June 7.—Mayor Gray claims the general strike is disintegrating. He pointed to the return of so per cent of the city's firemen to work and applications of other municipal employees as proof of his statement.

"The situation has changed from a battle of maneuver to stationary warfare," said Gray. "Stamina will determine the results now."

Twenty Canadian Pacific railroad operators returned to work today. Milk and bread depots are running smoothly. Most amusement places have reopened without interference.

DERNBERG DEFIANT

LONDON, June 7.—"We are not going to sign unless the treaty is made half decent," Herr Bernard Dernberg is quoted as saying in an interview published here today, according to a dispatch. Dernberg declared Germany cannot pay and the allies cannot make her pay.

ARRESTS COMING IN CANADIAN STRIKES

OTTAWA, June 7.—Reports on Canadian strikes received here today show the following: Winnipeg situation unchanged.

Calgary—Railway unions refuse to strike.

Toronto—Call for another general walkout has been deferred.

Montreal and Ottawa—Unchanged.

Mayor Gray of Winnipeg, sent word that government machinery is working to end radical agitation there, with arrests certain.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 7.—Organized telephone operators have decided to strike should the strike committee make a call. Food of all kinds can be secured. Butcher shops are operating with depleted staffs.

The situation along the waterfront remains unchanged. Coast boats continue to arrive. As soon as they dock their seamen and dockmen are called out by business agents of their union.

The city remains quiet.

WINNIPEG, June 6.—Parades and street gatherings were forbidden here by a mayor's proclamation, which was issued in hope of preventing such needless as occurred yesterday when general strike parades collided with a procession of returned soldiers opposing the strike. There were numerous fist fights.

Both factions are bidding for the support of returned soldiers. Employers and government officials claim the strike cannot last much longer as the strikers lack funds to continue it. It is said reports of actual need and of strikers asking for work are frequent. Strike leaders dispute this, saying there is no danger of being starved out.

Mayor Gray is accompanied by armed guards. It is claimed threats have been made against him.

New Postage Rate July 1.

The local postoffice had on hand when the three-cent postage law went into effect about two million two-cent stamps for which an increased demand will be felt on July 1, when the three-cent stamp will no longer be required to send one ounce of first class mail out of the city. One-cent stamps will also be much in demand as after the date set the two-cent stamp will not be needed in sending postcards. Business houses will be able to effect a considerable saving over the change back to old rates and it is probable that souvenir postcards will again prove popular. There will not be an over supply of three-cent stamps on hand, according to the local office, as since notification of the new July 1 ruling was made, the stamps have been transferred from one postoffice to another according as the need arose.

APPROPRIATION BILL LOWER

WASHINGTON, June 7.—An army appropriation bill carrying from eight to ten millions was reported to the house today by the military committee. This is a reduction in war department estimates of \$207,000,000. The bill as reported is \$300,000,000 less than that which the house passed last week.

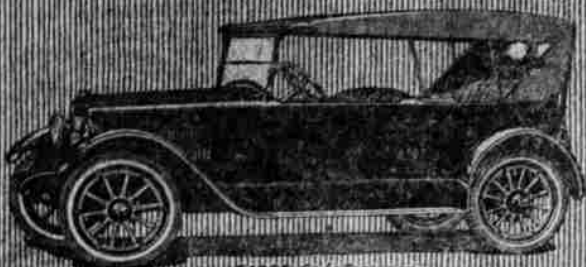
