EXPECT "Y" QUOTA BY MONDAY NIGHT

District Manager Confident
Necessary Amount
Coming.

No doubt exists in the mind of W. P. Walter, district Y. M. C. A. secretary, that the drive for funds now on in Umatilla county will be ended with the full quota subscribed by Monday night. All the teams have taken up the work and are meeting with encouraging success, he says.

Umatilla county is one of the three counties in the state which is making an effort to institute the county Y. M. C. A. plan, one of the others, Union county, also being in Mr. Walter's district. The third is Marion county. Every county in Oregon is subscribing to the fund which will be used in extending the scope of the organization.

As an indication that the Y. M. C. A. is still doing good work overseas, Mr. Walter submitted the following figures, which were sent to the Chicago Tribune on April 9 by Fred A. Smith, one of their special staff correspondents:

12 Tracts Indian Land to be Sold By Agent Aug. 18

Advertisements are issued by the Umatilla Indian agency inviting bids for the sale of 12 Indian allotments on August 18. Ten of the tracts lie on the south side of the river. The area of the land offered for sale aggregates 680 acres, and is appraised for a total valuation of \$56,170. Nine allotments are of forty acres, two of 80 acres and one of 160 acres. The land offered for sale is good wheat land except one forty acre tract, which lies about 3 miles above Pendleton on the north side of the river. The latter tract is good alfalfa land, and suitable for a home.

Grand Old Hostelry Famous in Early Days of Chicago, is Closed

CHICAGO, June 7.—For more than two years a temple for the republican high priests, a gathering place for Chicago's social leaders, a temporary dwelling for America's financiers, statesmen, actors and actresses, warriors, preachers, pugilists—the stable old Grand Pacific hotel, South Clark street and Jackson boulevard, closed last night.

The hostelry where Gen. Grant, Buffalo Bill, Bishop John Ireland, Henry Irving and John L. Sullivan held receptions when in Chicago will soon crumble away and in the place of the old hotel of cherished memories will appear a new skyscraper, the home of the Illinois Trust and Savings bank and the Merchants Loan and Trust company.

The Grand Pacific is probably the oldest hotel in Chicago. Both it and the Palmer house were rebuilt at about the same time after the fire of 1871, but Paul Gores, chief clerk at the Grand Pacific from 1882 to 1895 and now manager of the Congress hotel, expressed the belief today that the Grand was completed first.

AERIAL FOREST FIRE PATROLS ARE BEGUN

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—Aerial forest fire patrols are scheduled to start in California today. Two representatives of the district forester's office are in Sacramento to accompany two army pilots in flights over Uncle Sam's forests, the district forester's office announced.

The El Dorado, Tahoe and Stanislaus national forests will be covered by the patrols. One plane, leaving Mather field, will fly south, landing at Chinese camp, seven miles from Sonoma. The plane flying north will land near Oroville.

Daylight Savings May Go.
WASHINGTON, June 7.—A resolution to repeal the daylight saving law the last Sunday in October—the day the clocks go back to standard time—was favorably reported by the house interstate commerce committee today.

Synopsis of Drama.

Act I. Pontia in her father's palace in Judea, troubled at the disappearance of Christ from public life. She receives a visit from Dimonah, Herod's daughter, and from Tullia, the daughter of Jairus.

Act II. Scene I. Pontia sleeping. Ruth, exulting at the condemnation of Christ to Pilate, becomes insane and dies. At the death of Christ, the dead appear to Pontia, Tullia and Petronilla, who have witnessed the crucifixion, visit Pontia.

Scene 2. Pontia, a prisoner in her father's palace, in company with Tullia. Petronilla comes to tell of the resurrection. Claudia, Pontia's mother, comes in disguise to bid farewell since she has secretly joined the Holy Women.

Act III. Pontia in the imperial garden near the royal palace in Rome, with her slave Etheldreda. Empress Agrippina enters with Flavia, Cornelius, and her slaves. Cornelius, the Roman Augustus's wife, tells that the signs indicate that Pontia should marry Nero, Agrippina's son. Pontia refuses to become the spouse of her licentious son and Agrippina attempts to stab Pontia. She is saved by Etheldreda. Agrippina has her revenge.

Act IV. Pontia in the Palatine Palace. Pontia and Petronilla chained Flaminia, the Vestal Virgin, addressing them. Etheldreda is admitted. Agrippina visits them in prison. She is stiffened in the act of stabbing Petronilla. Pamphila, the prison keeper, tells them they are to be assassinated by slaves. Petronilla baptizes Pontia, who dies immediately after. As slaves rush in, Flaminia rushes in to prevent the stroke, and is rewarded by receiving the gift of Faith.

COLLEGE ATHLETES IN CHICAGO MEET

Four Hundred and Forty
Gallop, Hop or Plod
on Big Field.

CHICAGO, June 7.—Ticket takers at Stagg field, university of Chicago were hard pressed today. There was the task of assembling a grand stand crowd of spectators to equal the flock of athletes here in the annual Western conference championships.

Four hundred and forty-three athletes galloped, hopped or plodded—according to their events—on to the field when the program began. Every Big Ten school was represented and fourteen other Western institutions and men entered. Wahash, Grinnell, Ames, Kansas, Kansas Aggies, Nebraska, Drake, Notre Dame, Missouri, Lake Forest, American school of Osteopathy, Western State Normal of Michigan and Miami.

Ohio's entry list topped them all. Forty-nine men wore her colors. Michigan and Chicago had 41 each; Purdue 33, Notre Dame 26 and Indiana 14. Michigan U was the favorite. Other schools conceded themselves handicapped fifteen points with the Wolverine star, Carl Johnson, conceded victories in the two hurdles and the broad jump. Coach Stagg, looked to his distance men to keep honors in Chicago. Captain McCosh of Stagg's squad won the mile and two mile events in the indoor championships. Illinois placed much confidence in G. C. Buchheit, one of the most celebrated all round athletes in the conference.

Indiana hoped for points in the sprint and quarter, to be earned by Ray Briggs. Ohio state expected W. D. Griffith to take the javelin event. Ames presented a strong mile relay aggregation. Notre Dame expected to rough Michigan and Chicago with such stars as Griffith, Hayes and McEhan, all likely looking athletes.

University to Elect
New Graduate Manager
In Place of Walker

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 7.—Dean Walker, graduate manager of the university during the past year, will not be a candidate for the position again, according to his statement given out yesterday. Walker took the position merely in a war emergency to aid the university, he says. Although the faculty is strong in its appeal for him to remain in the position he will not consider it. He will probably remain as a member of the athletic department.

The athletic council has met several times during the past week to elect a successor but so far no definite action has been made. It is understood that Don Orput, graduate in 1915, now assistant in the athletic department; James Sheehy, president of the associated students last year, and Carl Nelson, a graduate this year, are being considered for the position.

APPROPRIATION CUT
WASHINGTON, June 7.—Republican house leaders and members of the military committee urged upon reduction of about 25 per cent in the war department's estimates for the army appropriation bill for the next fiscal year. Chairman Rabin, states the bill will carry about \$700,000,000 while estimates were \$1,117,000,000. The committee based army pay for next year on an average of 400,000 men.

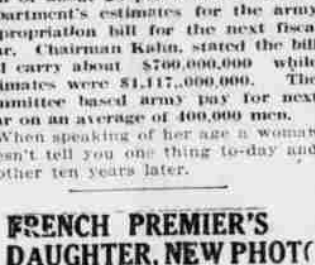

S. F. To Have First Public Aero Station

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—San Francisco is to have the first public aviation service station in the United States.

Lieutenant Frederick D. Stevenson, late chief radio instruction officer, U. S. Aviation Corps, at Tours, France, today secured permission from the Spring Valley Water Company for the use of a ten-acre tract one and one-half miles south and west of Golden Gate Park.

The field is 800 feet wide and 1500 feet long, perfectly level and considered by Lieutenant Stevenson a most ideal landing field. It is unhampered by buildings, trees or other obstructions, and needs only the removal of a few weeds to be in perfect condition. The new field may be the landing spot of the U. S. Army transcontinental flight which is scheduled to start next week.

The field will be open to every aviator in the United States. They will be invited to land there. A hangar to accommodate from fifteen to twenty-five machines will be constructed and other improvements will be made, such as a repair shop, gasoline station and quarters for mechanics. Later, arrangements may be made for night landing.
