ECHO ROAD WORK TO BE LET TOMORROW

New Bids Expected for Grading on Cabbage Hill Route.

With one of the busiest seasons of the present year in sight, State Highway Commissioner W. L. Thompson left for Portland last night to attend the June meeting, which opens tomorrow in Portland. Among the big contracts which will be let at this time are for grading the 15 miles between Echo and Rieth and for a similar amount of work between Cabbage Hill and Kamela.

Several counties are expected to send delegations to the meeting to solicit state aid for their county road projects. Numerous counties voted on road bonds at the special election held Tuesday and those who voted money for highways are expecting to get assistance from the commission.

HOW TO COLLECT FROM UNCLE SAM

WASHINGTON, June 9.—Life insurance companies were urged today by the Bureau of War Risk Insurance to open up information channels to advise dependents of American soldiers and sailors, how they may get compensations and allowances. District officers are E. recorded in the records. To make sure of receiving proper consideration, the Bureau stated, this is how each letter should be made out. When corresponding concerning allowances or allowances, letters should be addressed to the Accounting Division of the Bureau and contain these facts: full name of enlisted man, present address, his allotment number or army serial number, date of enlistment, rank and organization Nov. 1917 (or at enlistment, if subsequent thereto), full name of allottee, relationship to enlisted man and address.

When writing requests compensation letters addressed should be compensation and Insurance Claims Division of the Bureau and should contain full name of enlisted man, present address, his army serial number, date of death or discharge from service, full name of beneficiary and address.

"Red" Demonstration July 4 Contemplated

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Government officials have been informed that word is being passed through "red" circles for a demonstration July 4. Every precautionary measure is being taken to thwart the "reds" in so far as existing laws permit. According to reports of "May Day" outbreaks, June 24 bomb outrages, the spectacle planned for July 4 will constitute a progressive series of demonstrations against the government.

Parades and similar demonstrations designed to participate in riots appear to constitute the program of "reds" in their plans for a July 4 outbreak, according to propaganda literature and other information in the hands of government departments here. As a result organized labor officials as well as government authorities are expected to take steps to discourage participation of labor men, soldiers and sailors in parades which the "reds" will attempt to start.
