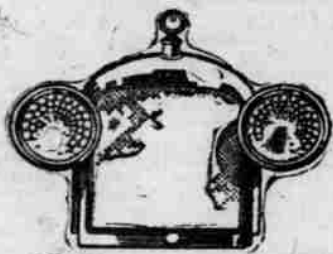

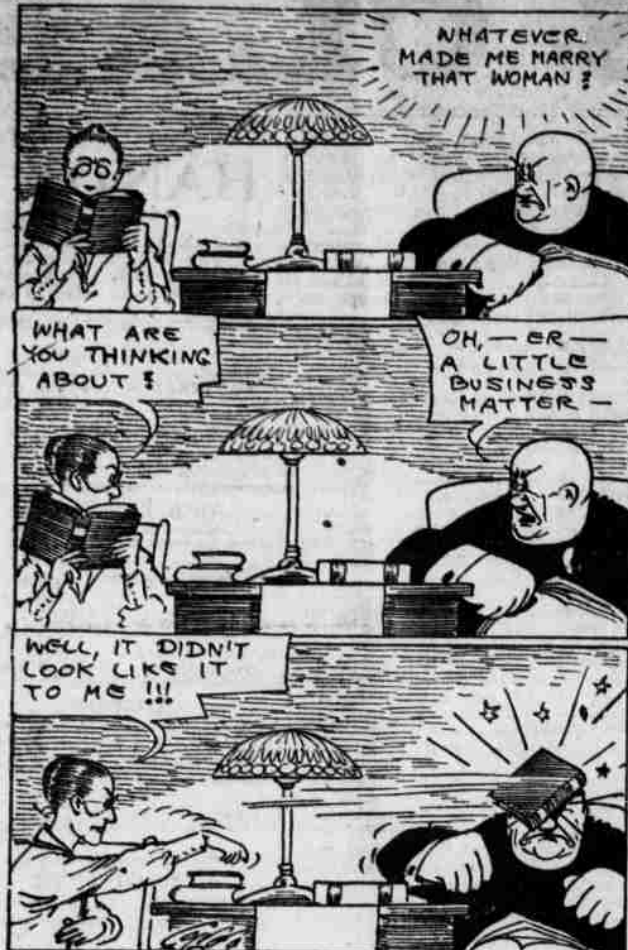

Mr. and Mrs. Will Howard of Butter Creek are visitors in town today. Mrs. Elmer Spilke has been quite ill the past few days.

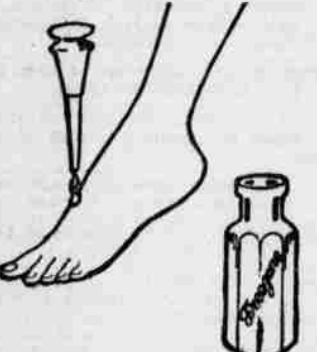

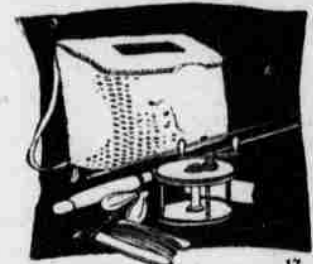
