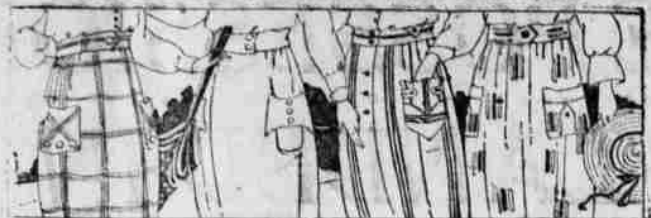

LABOR PROBLEMS BEFORE ROTARIANS

SALT LAKE CITY, June 16.—Rotarians to-day were prepared to help fight Bolshevism and labor unrest with what they believed is the strongest weapon—The Golden Rule.

At the annual convention which opened here to-day, more than 6,000 Rotarians planned to start a movement by which capital and labor may adjust their differences.

Officials expected the convention to recommend closer association between employer, manager and labor. Co-operations and encouragement to own homes were cited as some means by which conditions may be remedied.

Assistant Secretary of War Crumwell recently pinned a Distinguished Service Medal on Samuel Matthews Vail. Mr. Vail did not do any valorous deed at the front, but he did a lot to help beat the home. As president of the Fairview Locomotive Company he speeded up work and provided the necessary engines to take the doughboys and their supplies to the front. Then he helped very much in producing a mobile battery that silenced the big Krupp guns.

Dr. Henry Suzzallo, president of the University of Washington was to discuss "Capital, Labor, Management and the People." Suzzallo's address and the report of the International Rotary Committee, which has been studying the question, were to form the basis of discussion on labor.

Boys work was also to be given impetus, according to plans. Education and training in the trades, together with erection and maintenance of hospitals and homes were to be discussed. Rotary extension both in America and abroad, halted by the war, was another subject up for study. At a vocational meeting of builders, lumber and brick manufacturers study will be made as to ways and means for loosening the tension of present day construction. Members said they expected to get back of the government's housing plan.

Trips to Yellowstone Park and other districts of interest have been planned. Officers of the International Association of Rotary Clubs are: John Poole, Washington, D. C., president; Albert S. Adams, Atlantic City, vice-president; Edward R. Kelsey, Toledo, O., second vice-president; Willard I. Lansing, Providence, R. I., third vice-president; and C. R. Perry, Chicago, secretary.

Cut in Appropriation Would Cancel Flight Across Pacific Ocean

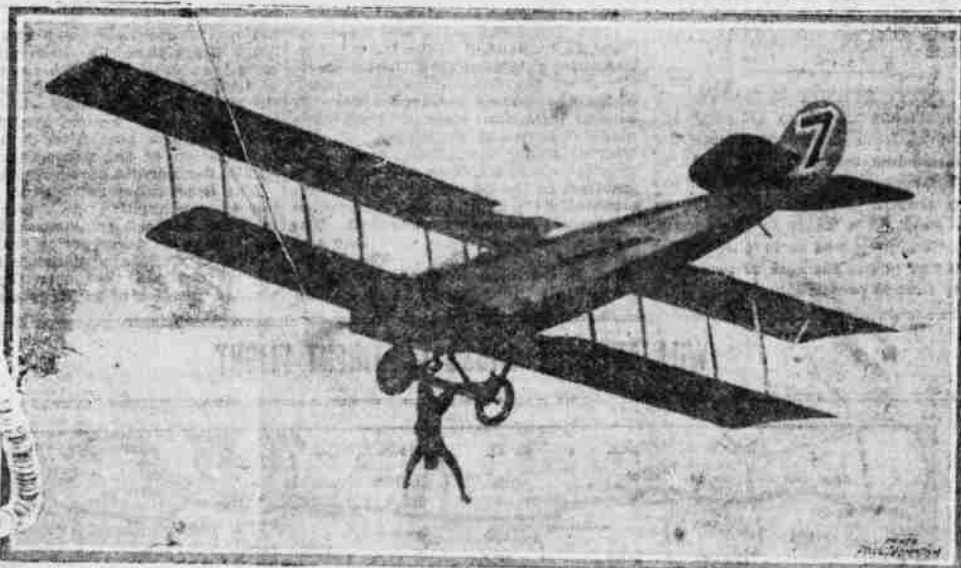

After the religious ceremony the boy was summoned to the castle where the one-time monarch congratulated him and gave him a gold tipin representing a crowned eagle, personally attaching the pin to his companion's tie.

POLICE FIND 4-YEAR-OLD BOY.

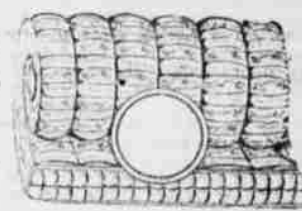
