BERLIN PRESS BITTER IN ITS DENUNCIATION

"Terms Unacceptable Before, no Change Made" is Declared.

BERLIN, June 18.—Whoever hereafter said the peace terms were acceptable must repeat it now since nothing has been changed," said the Tageblatt today. "We refuse the terms because we insist on self-determination and full sovereignty and are opposed to the nationalistic idea of revenge and emotional retribution which could not be avoided if we stand. Everyone looking into the future must say so."

"Scheldemann's words that hands which sign the treaty will dry up is still true," said the Lokal Anzeiger. "We hope the government will refuse to sign."

The Tagesspiegel Rundschau: "Viermany would never be recognized until"

she acknowledges a lie as truth, declared all German criminals and consented to every shame such as delivery of the Kaiser, his family and submarine commanders to the victors. We refuse to remain under the destroyers' feet."

Italian Cabinet quits Then Stays, Is Report

ROME, June 18.—Socialist groups in parliament decided to oppose the government's foreign policies. Other political factions met last night to determine their course of action in view of the Socialist vote.

Unconfirmed reports are circulated that Premier Orlando tendered the resignation of the entire cabinet to the king Monday. It is further reported the king asked Orlando to avoid a governmental crisis now and that the resignations were withdrawn.

Boston Cannot Count on Champs This Year

NEW YORK, June 18.—Roxbury and Red Sox have been equally disappointing to fans of Boston this year, but even with the handicaps they have been laboring under, neither crowd has been expected with losing chances as the attractions have turned out.

Both clubs have made valiant efforts to plug holes and the Braves are slowly making a success of their efforts. George Washington Grant, owner of the team which won a pennant and a world's championship so miraculously in 1918, has opened the purse wide.

The addition of Sir Bill James to the pitching staff as a possible aid to the corps ready for duty makes that spot look stronger, and the infield already is well taken care of with Hollo, Herzog, Maranville and Blackburne or Smith.

Stallings' Outfield Vexes
The outfield, as usual, has presented a problem for Manager Stallings. He has about an outfielder and a half to

cover the whole territory and hit in his league form. Ray Powell has the earmarks of a star, but he had served a veteran's period in the minors before some one took notice of him, and his term of usefulness therefore appears limited. Rizzetti, Cruise and Thorpe are very mediocre performers. The return of Hank Gowdy has strengthened the team behind the bat.

Stallings is striving mightily to build up a first class ball club, probably believing, as has been rumored, that his job probably hangs on the result of the season's play. His team has never failed to play the snappy, fighting game always demanded by the slumped Miracle Man and consequently never lacks an audience. A second division berth, however, is practically certain for the club.

The Red Sox present a complex problem. They looked so weaker while the season started than when they would up last year with a world's championship yet they have fallen hard after winning a few games at the start of the season.

The old infield is playing its usual kind of baseball, and the outfield shines with the exception of left field. The pitchers, however, have looked wide open, and the catching staff is not what it should be.

Ed Barrow has had his troubles. What with the temperamental outbursts of Babe Ruth and the lameness of Joe Bush. The rest of the pitchers have been unable to spring to the form they showed when they won at Tampa and on the way north battling the Giants.

There are rumors that the team is in the throes of internal trouble. If that is the case, there is small hope for the club. As it is going now, it cannot be figured higher than third place.

HOUSEHOLD

Eat All the Vegetables You Want
With the great variety of vegetables now coming on in the summer market the one should fail to eat them.
Serving Beans
Remove strings and snap or cut in

one-inch pieces; wash and cook in boiling water only until tender, adding salt last half-hour cooking. Drain, season with butter or butter substitute and salt.

Boiled Beet Greens
Wash thoroughly and scrape roots, cutting off ends. Drain and cook one hour or until tender in a small quantity boiling salted water. Season with butter or butter substitute, salt and pepper. Serve with vinegar.

Victory Cabbage
Slice rad cabbage and soak in cold water. Put one quart of the sliced cabbage in strainer with two tablespoons butter or butter substitute, one-half teaspoon salt, one tablespoon finely chopped onion, few grains cayenne, cook only until cabbage is tender. Add two tablespoons vinegar and one-half tablespoon sugar, and cook five minutes.

Carrots and Peas
Wash, scrape, and cut young carrots in small cubes or fancy shapes; cook until soft in boiling salted water or stock, add an equal quantity of green peas that have been cooked in such a small amount of water that it need not be drained off before serving. Season with butter, salt, and pepper.

Cauliflower a la Parmesan
Place whole cauliflower on a dish for serving. Sprinkle with grated cheese and pour one cup thin white sauce around cauliflower.

EVERY MEMBER OPPOSED
PARIS, June 18.—Every member of the German peace delegation including experts refused to participate in the signing of the treaty, according to a Weimer dispatch. The message added that the delegation submitted a report to the German government pointing out that the terms are impossible of execution and acceptance would place the nation in a position of equality as well as nonrecognition according to a report.

WOULD IGNORE INJUNCTIONS
ATLANTIC CITY, June 18.—The American Federation of Labor convention unanimously adopted a resolution urging that striking unions ignore in-

junctions detrimental to their interests and take the consequences. They also urged congress to curb the power of courts in issuing injunctions against strikers. The convention went on record favoring the restriction of immigration from Europe for a period of three years.

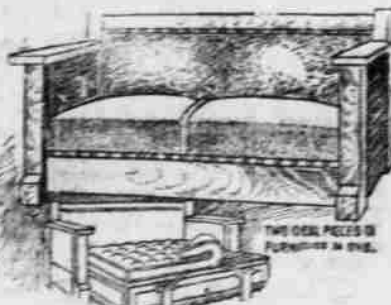
