### Pendleton Market News

**Eggs and Poultry.**

**Cantaloupes Take Another Slump.**  
Cantaloupes are still going down in price. Today they are selling in local markets at from 10c to 12 1/2c each. The 10c price is for the standard cantaloupes, with 45 in a crate.

**Apricots Cheaper in Local Markets.**  
Apricots, which made their initial appearance with a retail price of \$1.00 for a five pound basket, are down to 75c. Merchants say they may go lower.

**Chicken Market Takes Slump.**  
Weakness in the price of chickens in the coast cities has forced down the price of poultry in the local markets, according to the Pendleton Cash Market. The price in producer is 23 cents today, a drop of 3 cents from former prevailing prices.

**Prices Take Drop in Some Respect.**  
Today's prices give some news that will cheer the housewife. Fruit is lower, and it is expected that still further changes will be noted.

**Rhubarb Pays 1c to Producer.**  
Rhubarb in Pendleton markets pays the producer 4c a pound. Some of this product is being shipped in from Milton. It retails at three pounds for 25c. A new wrinkle which some Pendleton housewives are adopting because of the high cost of strawberries is the canning of rhubarb with strawberries. This fruit is being retailed at \$2.25 for field picked berries, and \$2 a crate for fancy table berries.

**Watermelons Drop From 10c to 6c.**  
The greatest change in local fruit markets today is in the price of watermelons, which are coming within the reach of the average consumer with a retail price of 6c instead of 10c. They are plentiful and are being shipped from California.

**Cherries Remain At 14c-20c Price.**  
Cherries do not follow the example of the other fruits and are still selling at from 14c to 20c. Royal Anns and Binga are both in the market.

**Raspberries Appear For First Time.**  
Raspberries, popular summer time fruit, appeared yesterday for the first time this season. They pay to Milton producers from \$2.50 to \$4 a crate, and retail at 20c a box.

**Hay Goes Up \$1 a Ton.**  
Hay in carload lots has gone up \$1 a ton, the Umatilla Flour and Grain Co. reports today. This makes the selling price at Pendleton \$26, while offerings are being made at \$21. f. o. b. Hermiston. Mill feed is unchanged with the market strong. Barley has not changed.

**Grain Bag Trade Reported Dead.**  
Although grain bags are selling here for 1 1/2c little or no buying is reported. Farmers are waiting to see what quantities they will need. One small lot of re-sell bags are being offered at 1 1/2c the price they were bought at several days ago.

**Market Dull in Cattle Allays.**  
Extreme dullness and almost stagnation is showing in the cattle alleys although there was only a very small run for the day. It is practically impossible to state exactly what top cattle would sell at but interests practically agree that the market is at least 50c below former values.

### WAR ON PACIFIC IS NEXT SAYS PHELAN

Senator Demands Legislation Forever Barring Japanese Coming.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Demanding legislation forever barring Japanese immigration, Senator Phelan of California today warned America to be ready for a "war on the Pacific." Appearing as a witness before the house of immigration committee Phelan appealed to congress to save the western states from economic death at the hands of "sons of the East."

"The sore spot of the world is the orient," Phelan said. "It's a place to be watched for eventualities. Our future wars will be on the Pacific, not on the Atlantic. The huns have come—the huns of the East. Those Japanese are not to be comprehended with; they must be driven out like a plague of locusts which they equal in economic destructiveness."
