

CORBETT AND JOHN L. USED FIRST GLOVES IN TITLE BOUT

There was no real world's champion in the heavyweight class until John L. Sullivan made his name of the title by having defeated Jake Kilrain and Jaddy Ryan. The title was recognized as vested in him at that time and has been handed down through a succession of pugilists.

Sullivan was the first heavyweight champion under Queensberry rules and engaged in the first heavyweight bout ever contested with gloves when he was defeated by James J. Corbett.

Since Sullivan's time only one champion has held the title who was an American—Bob Fitzsimmons. Fitz really was an American in everything he did, but he was born in England, and came to this country from Australia. Several foreigners have attempted to wrest the title from holders in this country, but never has the effort been successful.

Sullivan lost his title to Corbett September 7, 1902, at New Orleans.

Corbett was beaten in fourteen rounds at Carson City, Nev., by Bob Fitzsimmons, March 17, 1897.

Fitzsimmons was knocked out in eleven rounds at Coney Island, N. Y. June 8, 1899, by James J. Jeffries.

Jeffries Held Crown.
Jeffries defended his title successfully against several challenges, including Fitzsimmons, whom he again knocked out in eight rounds on July 25, 1902, at San Francisco; Tom Sharkey, whom he outpointed in twenty-five rounds at Coney Island, and Jack Munroe, who lasted only two rounds at San Francisco, Aug. 28, 1904.

Jeffries retired in 1905, and after Jack Root had been knocked out by Marvin Hart in a bout referred to by Jeffries, the champion presented Hart with the title and belt. Jack O'Brien

claimed the title, but was given no recognition. The public also disliked to accept Hart and after Tommy Burns had defeated him on Feb. 23, 1906 was subsequently defeated in 1908 in Australia by Jack Johnson, clamor became so great that Jeffries was induced to enter the ring to save the title from passing into the hands of a negro.

Jeffries proved an easy mark for Johnson in their memorable meeting on July 4, 1910. The negro won in fifteen rounds.

John left the country in 1913, going to Europe, and a tournament was held in California for white heavyweights, which was won by Luther McCarty. He was recognized as the heavyweight champion of America.

Long List of "White Hopes"
On May 24, 1913, McCarty met Arthur Pelkey in Calgary, Canada, and was knocked out in the first round. He collapsed and died in the ring.

Pelkey was reluctantly accepted as the white heavyweight champion, but was knocked out in fifteen rounds on Jan. 1, 1914 by Gunboat Smith at San Francisco.

This ended the so-called effort to dig up a white heavyweight championship, for the quality of the boxers was so poor that the public refused to recognize such a title.

In the meantime Johnson met and defeated Frank Moran, white heavyweight of Pittsburg, in twenty rounds in Paris.

Jack Johnson agreed to meet Jess Willard on April 5, 1915, in Havana, Cuba, and was knocked out in twenty-six rounds.

Willard has defended his title since, defeating Frank Moran in a time-honored bout in New York, March 25, 1916.

RID COUNTRY OF ALIEN "REDS" CONGRESS' AIM

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Congressional leaders are determined to rid the country of alien "reds" and bar America's doors against more coming in through drastic deportations, and immigration legislation to be accomplished next month under present plans, Chairman Johnson of the House immigration committee said, today.

Plans to carry out the work are set aside in a statutory bill which is expected to pass congress before July 1. The bill grants \$1,500,000 for crime detection and \$500,000 which is specifically designated to finance anarchistic opposition and \$100,000 for deportation of undesirable aliens.

YANKS ATTURED IN SILKEN PAJAMAS

LE MANS, France, June 20.—From silk pajamas fringed with lace to concrete floors of a guardhouse typifies the transition of a number of United States army consuls who commandeered the belongings of a French count here, while the latter had left his chateau for the front.

The wholesale appropriation of the count's belongings by the consuls was made known to the military police by the count when he returned from the front on leave.

The army restored all the appropriated articles while the men who enjoyed the luxuries are lodged in the guardhouse.

Pigeons in Belgium Sell for \$90 Each

PARIS, June 21.—Blooded pigeons are being sold in the invaded districts of France and Belgium for as high as \$90 each.

The general high cost of living is not considered as having any effect on this price, for the reason that at \$90 each pigeons can no longer be regarded as an article of food. The price is due to other causes. During the German occupation of northern France and Belgium, no effort was made to keep up the local industry of pigeon breeding. Instead, the Germans ate what pigeons were there at the time of their invasion and thus the breeds died out entirely.

With the return to these districts of the regular inhabitants, efforts are being made to renew the breeding of blooded pigeons.

Three Miners Taking Bullion Near Juneau

JUNEAU, Alaska, June 21.—(By United Press)—Reports which have been received here state that three miners are successfully taking out bullion there with a small prospect mill. They handle about three tons of sorted ore daily, and make exceptionally good miners' wages during the summer months. They also carry on considerable development work during the season.

The miners are Mrs. J. G. Peterson and her two daughters.

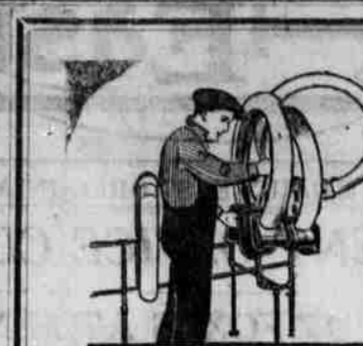

ORLANDO RESIGNED AS ITALY'S CHIEF

ROME, June 20.—The Italian government resigned this evening following an adverse vote against it in the chamber of deputies.

Premier Orlando, in announcing his resignation and that of the cabinet, said King Victor Emmanuel had reserved decision as to acceptance.

The chamber of deputies had by a vote of 259 to 78 rejected Premier Orlando's motion in favor of discussing the question of confidence, which related to the foreign policy of the government in secret session.

Prior to the vote, Premier Orlando, in addressing the chamber, said: "Italy's peace with Germany and Austria has been solved in a manner with which, on the whole, I feel satisfied."

Insisting on the necessity of a secret session, the premier declared the government needed greater confidence and would treat his motion for a secret session as a question of confidence.

The socialists immediately opposed this.

SCIENTISTS WILL DISCUSS QUAKE

PASADENA, Cal., June 20.—To discuss scientific data with a view to improving conditions on the Pacific Coast, including an extensive survey of the resources of the North Pacific Ocean, more than four hundred scientists are here for the convention of the Pacific Division of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, which opened today and will continue four days.

Cause of earthquakes and means of protection against them will be discussed by Dr. S. D. Townley, Stanford University. Other speakers are: Dr. William Ritter, director Scripps Institute for Biological Research; Dr. Barton W. Evermann, California Academy of Sciences; Dr. Joseph Grinnell, University of Washington; director of the College of Fisheries; E. L. Michael and C. F. McEwen, Scripps Institution for Biological Research; E. A. Beals, U. S. Weather Bureau; George Loudermilk, professor of Geology, University of California; Dr. T. D. MacDougal, director of the research department, Carnegie Institute.

Excursions to fossil deposits, Catalina Island, including study of sea-life from blast-bottomed boats have been arranged. The new 100-inch reflecting telescope at Mt. Wilson observatory will be ready for use during the session.

Besides the main convention, there will be sessions of the Pacific Coast astronomical, chemical, geological, geographical, seismological, naturalist and ecological societies.

Systematic exploration of the northern reaches of the Pacific Ocean may be the outgrowth of this convention. Such plans will constitute one of the main subjects under discussion.

24 of 40 League Nations Catholic Is New Objection

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Fear that the Vatican will be restored to temporal dominion over the world by organization of the league of nations was expressed Friday by Senator Sherman in speech to the senate. He pointed out that 24 of the 40 nations which will be members of the league adhere to the Roman Catholic church. He said the Vatican will be able to control their votes in the league on political and economic questions. He intimated this might interfere with religious liberty in the United States and elsewhere.

"To Hell With Fall" is Motto at Mather Field

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 21.—(By United Press.)—"Always hoping for success and to hell with fall" has been adopted as the motto at the Mather field air service flying school. The phrase was used by George Cing, a disappointed 18-year-old Chinese boy who unsuccessfully tried to enlist in the United States air service.

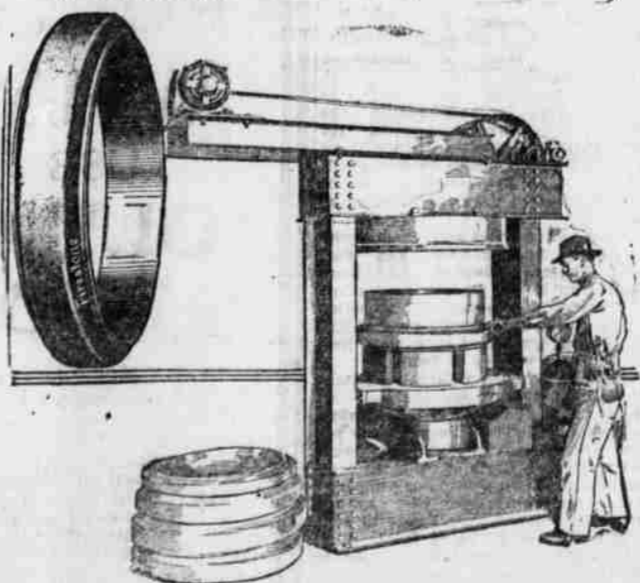
