Ernest Chandler of Helix was in Adams Friday.

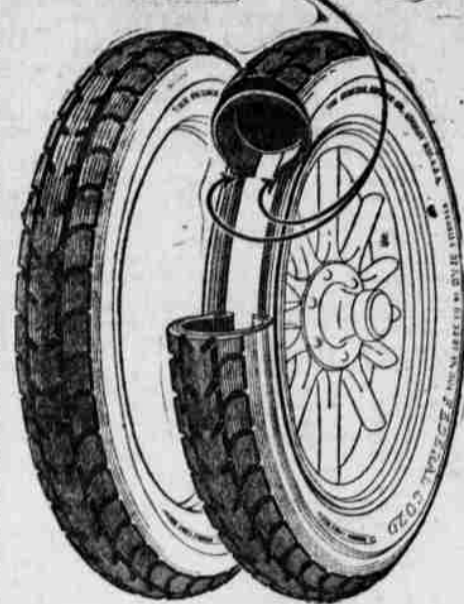
BUILDING GREAT WHEAT STORAGE PLANT IN N. S. W.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 21.—Work on the great wheat storage and shipping plant, which is being pushed with great vigor by the government, is progressing rapidly.

Grain silos and terminal elevators being constructed will complete the bulk handling scheme and will constitute a national work of vital importance to wheat industry.

These storage bins at Glebe Island will have an aggregate capacity of 5,522,000 bushels of wheat, while the working house will have an added capacity of 800,000 bushels. The whole is expected to be ready to handle the 1920-21 harvest.

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
