"A. B. M." CLEW TO GEM THIEF

CHICAGO, June 24.—The police made little progress today toward locating the burglars who Sunday night visited the home of Mrs. Nellie Morgan, 401 Pullerton parkway, while she was entertaining guests on the veranda and made away with \$2500 worth of jewels and a dozen silk shirts. Along with the silk shirts, however, the burglars took something that may lead them to grief. This

was the monogram of Adolphus Busch, Magnus whose property they were. His initials were embroidered on the sleeves of each shirt. Finger print experts who visited the Loeb home this morning on order of Capt. Michael Evans of the bureau of identification were unable to find any marks that would assist in identifying suspects. The dispatch and skill with which the men carried out the burglary convinced detectives that they are experts in their line and it is presumed that they wore gloves in order to leave no tell tale finger marks.

But though there were no finger prints to record the identity of the burglars, there were footprints. These were discovered today near the house. The gardener and the weather had kept the soil thoroughly watered in the vicinity of the house and every step the intruders took while looking for a place of entrance left its mark.

GERMANY'S FIGURES ON PRISONERS WRONG

PARIS, June 26.—German figures on the number of French prisoners held in Germany were found to be incorrect, Leon Abram, under secretary in the ministry of war, announced in the chamber of deputies today. More than 60,000 French prisoners in excess of the German figures were found in Germany. The number of French soldiers missing in action has reached 214,000, the under secretary said.

EACH HOME STILL HAS ITS BOTTLE STOPPERS

WASHINGTON, June 25.—An unprecedented demand for patent bottle stoppers has been made in recent months, druggists have informed members of the senate judiciary committee, which has before it the bill to enforce the prohibition laws. This is taken as one of the signs of preparedness for the coming of prohibition, and indicating the extent to which individuals intend to prepare beverages privately.

FRANCIS X. BUSHMAN SUED BY FIRST WIFE FOR \$9,000 ALIMONY

NEW YORK, June 26.—Francis X. Bushman, the screen star, was sued Wednesday by his first wife for \$9,000 alimony due her under a decree of divorce which she obtained in Baltimore in July, 1918. Under the decree of divorce Mrs. Bushman was ordered to pay Mr. Bushman \$40,000 in installments of \$10,000 each with interest on unpaid balances and also to pay \$232.25 for the support of their children in addition to their schooling, clothes and medical treatment.

TRADE SECRETS ARE ARE DISAPPEARING

Priceless Knowledge Guarded Too Jealously, Artists Deprived of Benefits.

Numerous are the trade secrets handed down generation by generation from father to son, and vast is the capital made out of some of them in the commercial world of today. Many, alas! are the priceless trade secrets buried far down below the moldering dust of the misty past, and lost to the world, perchance never again to be recovered.

To cite the first example that occurs to the mind of the writer in the Boston Globe, for instance, what would a Royal Academician of the present day give to be possessed of the secret held by the old masters for mixing their colors so as to render them imperishable and impervious to the ravages of time?

The red colors, especially, of these artists of a bygone epoch are every whit as bright now as they were three long centuries ago. On the contrary, the colors of pictures painted only a hundred years ago have lost their luster, and are faded and decayed to a deplorable extent.

Again in the world of music, the manufacturers of violins treasured a recipe for varnish that sank into the wood of their incomparable instrument, and mellowed it as well as preserved it.

With such extreme, relentless jealousy, however, did they guard their great secret that it, too, is lost to all appearances, irretrievably.

Rather more than 180 years ago there lived in a quaint old-world village in Wales a working blacksmith, who had managed, by some means or other, to bring the welding of steel to such a pitch of perfection that the joint was absolutely invisible, and the temper of the steel as fine as on

the day it left the tinker's hands.

He was offered large and tempting sums to divulge his secret, but kept it obstinately to himself, and when his span of life had run its course he took it with him to another world.

The ancient Greeks had a substance which we call Greek fire, and which they used in naval warfare.

Their method of employing it was simply this—to throw the substance upon the surface of the water, where it flamed up and set fire to the ships of the enemy.

What was it? The only known substance of the present day that would do this is the metal potassium, but to set fire to a ship in the manner described would necessitate the use of at least half a ton of that metal.

Where did the Greeks obtain the substance they used with such effect? Or how did they make it. If Greek fire was potassium, the secret of the process is another that must be numbered with the lost.

The man who could decipher the buried recipe for Roman mortar would be bowed down to and worshipped by the builders of the present day. How they made it is a profound secret, and bids fair to remain so.

The mortar is as firm now as it was 2000 years ago; it has calmly scoffed at the ravages of time and weather.

PUEBLO CAR WORKER IS INSTANTLY KILLED

PUEBLO, Colo., June 26.—John Van Pool, 21, a car repairer employed by the Missouri Pacific, was instantly killed Thursday morning when a box car under which he was working slipped from its jack and broke his back.

BIG BUILDING BOOM IS ON IN COLORADO

GREENLY, Colo., June 26.—There is nearly \$500,000 worth of building being erected in Greeley at the present time, and contractors have plans for at least twenty-five more residences ranging in price from \$3,500 to \$5,000, which will be started as soon as workmen are available. These buildings represent fifty-one residences from \$3,500 to \$5,000 each, the new Presby-

terian church at \$70,000, a business block at \$29,000, remodeling of the Union National bank at \$70,000, a new hotel at \$25,000, and a new garage at \$20,000.

The old Presbyterian church corner at Eighth avenue and Tenth street has been purchased by W. C. Roberts, who has announced that he will start the erection of a new \$65,000 hotel building there sometime this fall.

MORE ATTEMPTS TO MASTER THE AIR

LONDON, June 26.—Secret experi-

ments are being carried out near London with a view to perfecting an invention which, it is claimed, will be the greatest step yet made towards the complete mastery of the air with a heavier-than-air machine. This is a "helicopter" aeroplane, capable of rising and descending vertically without "getting its nose up," and able to hover in the air. All the flying machines of the novelists have been able to rise vertically, but so far this has not been possible in practical aviation. The British Air Ministry is directing the tests.
