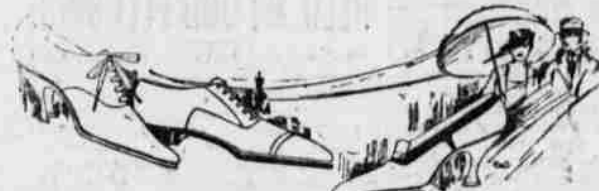

PRINCE OF WALES IS GOOD DANCER

BERKELEY, Cal., June 26.—The Prince of Wales is a good dancer. Miss Elizabeth Witter, University of California girl, says so and she ought to know, for she danced with him. Miss Witter has just returned from a service of a year and a half with the American Red Cross in canteen work which was organized by Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt.

WAR, JUST PAST, COST BILLIONS IN MONEY, MILLIONS IN LIVES

Supreme Price paid by 7,560,000 Dollars Outnumber 186 Billion.

(Written for the United Press.) The war which is now officially ending has cost the world \$7,560,000,000 in lives and \$186,750,000,000 in money. The allies have paid a death toll of 4,810,000 and \$129,500,000,000 for victory. The central powers have lost 2,750,000 in killed, and \$56,250,000 in addition to the indemnity they must pay for their unsuccessful attempt to dominate the world.

It will cost the allies six billion dollars annually to pay the interest on their war debts. Germany's interest bill will be about two billion dollars yearly. The other central powers will probably repudiate their obligations, but if they don't, their yearly interest will approximate \$1,300,000,000.

These annual charges will be increased for the purpose of paying off part of the principle of the war debts. The present European generation from now onward will have to raise at least four or five times as much money by taxation as before the war, or see the old world go into bankruptcy, with all bank accounts in danger of confiscation.

"Lone Star" Dietz to Stand Trial Again On New Indictment

SPOKANE, Wash., June 27.—Only a few hours after a jury in United States district court here had been dismissed because of failure to agree on the guilt or innocence of William H. (Lonestar) Dietz on charges of false draft registration, he was reindicted by a federal grand jury on new charges in the same connection, arraigned in district court and released on his bond of \$10,000, which he had already furnished.

The indictment returned today charges in two counts, false registration for the draft and falsification of his draft questionnaire. It is charged that Dietz falsely declared that he was born on the Pine Ridge Indian reservation in South Dakota, that he was a full blood Sioux Indian and that he was the head of a motion picture company here which was a necessary industrial enterprise.

"The jury which heard the evidence in Dietz' trial on similar charges was dismissed at 10 a. m., after having deliberated fruitlessly since 2 p. m. Wednesday.

The new indictment was returned at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Witnesses for both government and defense agreed in the trial on the first indictment that Dietz was born at Rice Lake, Wis., and that his father was a white man. Dietz was engaged last season as coach for the Mare Island marine corps football team. Prior to that he had served two seasons in a similar capacity at Washington state college.

Lumber Carriers On Ways.

ALBANY, Wash., June 27.—Initiation of wooden shipbuilding for private account is announced today by the Gray's Harbor Motorship corporation, which has laid keels for two new five-masted barkentines of the Ward type. These ships will be used to carry lumber from Gray's Harbor to Great Britain. More contracts are expected soon. The corporation will increase its fleet by several hundred men. It is announced.

The last of the ships built for the shipping board is nearing completion at the yard.

Trunk Highway Is Urged.

LEWISTON, Idaho, June 27.—At the suggestion of the Idaho state highway department a committee of the Commercial Club, comprising E. A. White, Eugene Cox, C. C. Van Arsdale and Frank Thompson, met with the Nez Perce county commissioners yesterday and presented the need for unified action among the various road districts toward the construction of a trunk highway from the Montana line down the Clearwater to Lewiston.

This highway will form a link of the Lewis and Clark highway, which will extend from Missoula to Lewiston, here it will connect with the Evergreen highway.

WEIMAR, June 27.—The Socialist Congress has rejected a proposal for a soviet constitution for Germany. The proposal received only one vote. The congress adopted a resolution declining to give pensions to members of former royal families.
