

FOURTH OF JULY HERE WILL BE GREAT VICTORY CELEBRATION

FEED FOR SERVICE MEN TO BE FEATURE

Billy and Ma Sunday Will be Here on the Fifth of July.

Pendleton is mighty glad the war is over and she'll tell the world she is on July 4 and 5, when a Victory Celebration will constitute the biggest patriotic event ever staged in the city. And she's going to be generous, too, for every town in Umatilla county will be asked to join in the joy fest.

Pat men's race, three legged race, sack race, water fight, ball games and dancing—they're all on the program, with a visit from Billy Sunday and "Ma" included, as well as a promise that Pendleton will have a crack in the neck from watching the stunts of an airman.

And because July 4, 1919, necessarily centers around those boys who served on land and sea, service men are to be guests of honor of super-excellent chow at Eagle-Woodman hall, the first day of the celebration.

SCORE TEACHERS COMPLETE TEST

Semi-Annual Examinations Underway Since Wednesday.

A score of Umatilla county school teachers, candidates for state certificates, this afternoon completed taking the semi-annual examinations which have been under way at the Pendleton High School since 3 a. m. Wednesday. The examinations were given at the high school owing to the Circuit court being in session this week.

County School Superintendent W. W. Green had charge of the examinations and was assisted by Mrs. Green and Miss Anna Brown, teacher at Echo. Virtually all subjects taught both in the grades and the high schools were written on and the papers go to the capital for grading. The next examination for certificates will be held during the four days commencing Dec. 17.

On Wednesday morning the subjects written in were: U. S. history, writing, music and drawing. Wednesday afternoon physiology, reading, manual training, composition, domestic science, methods in reading, course of study for drawing and methods in arithmetic were given.

Thursday morning's program included arithmetic, history of education, physiology, methods in geography, mechanical drawing, domestic art, and course of study in domestic art. Thursday afternoon was given to examinations in grammar, geography, stenography, and thesis for primary certificate.

Theory and practice, spelling, physical geography, English literature and chemistry were written Friday morning while on Friday afternoon school law, geology, civil government and algebra were given.

The program this morning included examinations in geometry and botany and the afternoon closed with general history and bookkeeping. Not all candidates wrote in all these subjects, only those desiring special certificates taking examinations in domestic art, course of study in domestic art, domestic science, drawing, course of study for drawing, manual training, mechanical drawing, music, stenography and typewriting.

Is New Employee.

Sues for \$1800 on Note.

Gross Leaves Big Estate.
The estate of George W. Gross, of Athena, is valued at \$102,849.70 in a report filed by the appraisers, M. L. Watts, H. A. Barrett and W. S. Persing. Of his \$2500 was in Liberty bonds and W. S. S., and about \$70,000 in land. The estate of John B. Owen was worth \$28,318.45, according to the inventory of William Duff. Polydore Moens, and C. L. Elgin. The estate of Lowell M. Zerba, a minor, was appraised at \$250.

Auto Owner Before Judge.
When a machine found later to belong to H. C. Walker tried to run over Motorcycle Officer Longley a few nights ago, machinery was set in motion which culminated in bringing Walker before the Justice of the Peace Joe H. Parks at 2 o'clock Friday. Walker alleges that his car was appropriated by an unknown driver that evening and he is not responsible. A second charge against Walker is that he bought the car several weeks ago but never notified the secretary of state of the change. The charge against him is that operating a motor vehicle without proper license.

Burgess Predicts 80 Per Cent Crop.
"There will be about an 80 per cent crop in my section," says J. N. Burgess of Umatilla county. "Save where the soil is thin, the situation looks very favorable and conditions are better than a year ago." Speaking of wool, Mr. Burgess predicts that the price, now ranging from 45 to 55 cents, will go even higher owing to a wool shortage. Mr. Burgess leaves today for Salem to attend a meeting of the state livestock sanitarians' board of which he is a member.—Oregonian.

Portland Told of State Hospital.
Between 500 and 600 patients are now being cared for at the state hospital at Pendleton, according to Dr. W. D. McNary, in charge of the institution, who is at the Imperial. Most of these patients come from east of the Cascade mountains, although a few have been transferred from the main hospital at Salem, for one reason or another. Linn County Farmer Disappears in Same Manner as Minister

CORVALLIS, Or., June 28.—Ralph Hinds, a young farmer living near Shedd, came to Corvallis Wednesday for a truckload of cement. He got the cement, started home and has not been seen since. The sheriff of Linn county was notified and this afternoon he discovered the auto load of cement and the young man's clothes on the banks of the Willamette about a mile and a half east of Corvallis.

Sheriff Gelatley of Corvallis was notified and the firemen's grappling hooks were secured and rushed to the scene, where the river is now being dragged for the body. So far as is known, Mr. Hinds was having no family or financial trouble and his young wife, who was formerly Miss Ruth Primus of Philomath, is nearly distracted.

Rev. J. Cronenberger disappeared from this city this summer in a similar manner. His empty automobile and his clothing were found by the river's edge. After searching the river for nearly a week, it was discovered he had fled the country and had left his effects on the river bank as a blind. He has not yet been discovered.

PROHIBITION LAWS REPORTED

As the bill stands, more lenient laws are provided in one section for wartime prohibition than for the constitutional prohibition section.

UMATILLA, STANFIELD SEEING OVER THE TOP

WEALTHY SOCIETY WOMAN AND NEGRO SEEK TO MARRY

BOSTON, June 28.—The reported elopement of Miss Mabel Puffer, wealthy society woman of the fashionable Sandy Pond section of Ayer, and "Honey" Hazzard, a negro choroman, has stirred the residents of the town in demanding that the marriage be stopped.

Miss Puffer and the negro have made formal application for a marriage license in Concord, N. H., the Chief of Police announced today. They are now stopping there at the Proctor Hotel, and said to be frequently walking together on the streets there.

Miss Puffer and Hazzard are reported to have left Ayer last Sunday night in an automobile. Miss Puffer is forty-eight years old and Hazzard fifteen years her junior.

Miss Puffer has a brother, an army captain who is still in France. She is well known as a reader. A few years ago her father, a prominent citizen of Ayer, died and left her \$15,000 in cash and valuable property in Ayer. She is also the owner of property in New Hampshire, where her holdings are extensive.
