Praises New Hatchery Site.

Marion Jack, member of the State fish and game commission, who returned Saturday evening from Portland, visited Oak Ridge on the Salmon river where the commission has decided to locate the new hatchery and says that the site is an excellent one. The location, according to Mr. Jack, is especially well adapted to the needs of a hatchery because it will cover 100 acres of land, in a sheltered cove. Small streams of the Salmon river will afford a natural habitat for the young fish, while ample shade is provided by a grove of maple trees. Jack says there will be more fish in the new hatchery than at Bonneville.

Parcel No. 1 contains a number of lots in Ukiah, No. 2 is a quarter of a quarter section of land, No. 3, consists of two half lots in Pendleton, No. 4 consists of two lots in Pendleton and 15 consists of two blocks in Nyssa. James A. Fee is the plaintiff's attorney.

Chautauqua Workers Busy.

The advertising committee of the 1919 Chautauqua hope by tomorrow afternoon to have a program in every home in the city. Tickets sell for \$2.75, which means that each performance costs about 31 cents, while if single tickets are bought, the cost is about 83 cents a performance. The committee calls attention to the fact

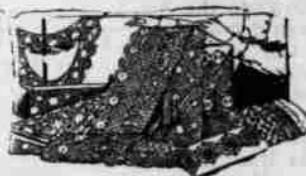
