Wants Timber for Project.

J. T. Hinkle, of Hermiston, today made application to the government through the U. S. forest service for 4,000,000 board feet of timber which is planned for use in building flumes for the Teel irrigation project. The area,

which is in the vicinity of Canas creek, will be examined under the direction of the government and a valuation placed upon the timber.

Mrs. Earl E. Weston received a telegram today from her husband stating that he is at Camp Mills, L. I., having landed after a year's service with the 4th regiment, Headquarters C. A. S. M. Weston enlisted in March, 1918, and has served as an air service mechanic.

Miles Spiermann, just discharged from the 146th field artillery at Camp Lewis, will arrive in Pendleton this afternoon on No. 7 from Walla Walla and will make his home here with his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Miles. It is his intention to go to Chicago this fall to enter a school of art. Spiermann enlisted at Walla Walla.

Recruiting Officers to Athena.

Captain Walter B. Swackhamer, First Sergeant William McKennie and Private Henry Kretschman left today for Athena, Weston and Milton, where they will continue their recruiting duties for the United States army. While in Pendleton they secured five recruits and hope to return here to continue the work.

Other Intervenor Listed.

Beside Pendleton, three northwest cities and the public service commissions of both Oregon and Washington have intervened in the Portland rate case which is to be heard beginning July 21. Kennewick, Vancouver and Seattle are the other intervenors. It is thought here that the first two named are supporting Portland's contention for a lower rate.

New By-Laws Received.

By-Laws and minutes of the proceedings of the initial meeting of the Oregon Association of Commercial Secretaries, which was organized at The Dalles in May, were received today by C. K. Cranston, secretary of the local commercial association from A. W. Nelson of La Grande, secretary of the new body.

Wants More Round-Up Cards.

A renewed supply of Round-Up picture postcards is asked by Benjamin Williams, representative of the northwest states for the Welcome Home station at Newport News, Va. Several cards were mailed weeks ago and have interested returning Oregon and Pendleton boys so much that many have asked for cards. A large supply will be sent Mr. Williams as soon as possible.

Will See Tacoma Races.

Councilman Claude Penland, Mrs. Penland, their two children and Mr. and Mrs. Harrah left this afternoon on a 19 days' auto trip to Puget sound in Mr. Penland's car. They will go by way of Kennewick and Yakima, through Snoqualmie Pass on the Sunset highway and be in Tacoma in time to take in the races on the Fourth at the speedway there. Before returning they will visit Seattle and Mr. Penland will look into the auto truck prospects there.

More Mechanic's Blanks Arrive.

The supply of application blanks for auto mechanics' licenses has been replenished by a new shipment received at the county clerk's office. The original shipment was 15 blanks. The secretary of state is now mailing the forms to all garages as well. The blanks properly filled out must be in the hands of the board of examiners by July 5.

Sheriff Goes After Auto Thief.

Sheriff T. D. Taylor left Sunday at 1:15 for Miles City, Montana, to bring back Robert Grant, who was captured there with the stolen J. B. McCook car. Mr. Taylor is also deputized by Mr. McCook to pay the \$100 reward to Grant's captor. It is expected that the sheriff and prisoner will not arrive here until Thursday as Miles City is close to the Dakota line.

No Bond Check Appears.

A check for \$19 signed with the name of M. J. H. Luck and made payable to Calla Shawaway, has been turned over to the authorities and an attempt is being made to locate the payee, who is said to be an Indian girl. The checks was passed on the J. C. Penney Co. in payment of some silk hose and other merchandise and was returned marked "no account" by the bank. It is said another check made out in the same manner, is out but has not been reported to the sheriff's office.

Tickets Selling Well.

The seat sale for the Chahtaqua which opens here July 5 is progressing favorably, according to the members of the ticket committee which met this morning at the office of W. W. Green, county school superintendent. The committee requests, however, that anyone who wishes to purchase tickets notify members of the committee or Miss Grace Gilliam, secretary of the association. The association announces that a Chahtaqua ticket will be sufficient for entrance to the William Jennings Bryan lecture July 11, as there will be no extra charge.

June Fines Total \$237.

Fines and forfeitures in police court for June totaled \$237, there being 29 cases before Judge Fitz Gerald. Ten violations of the drunk and disorderly ordinance were tried and the remaining 19 were for violation of the traffic ordinance. Ten persons forfeited half, 17 pleaded guilty, one was given a suspended sentence and one paid an old fine running over from April. The stiffest fine of the month was one for \$50. June business was considerably short of that of May, when 25 cases were up for trial.

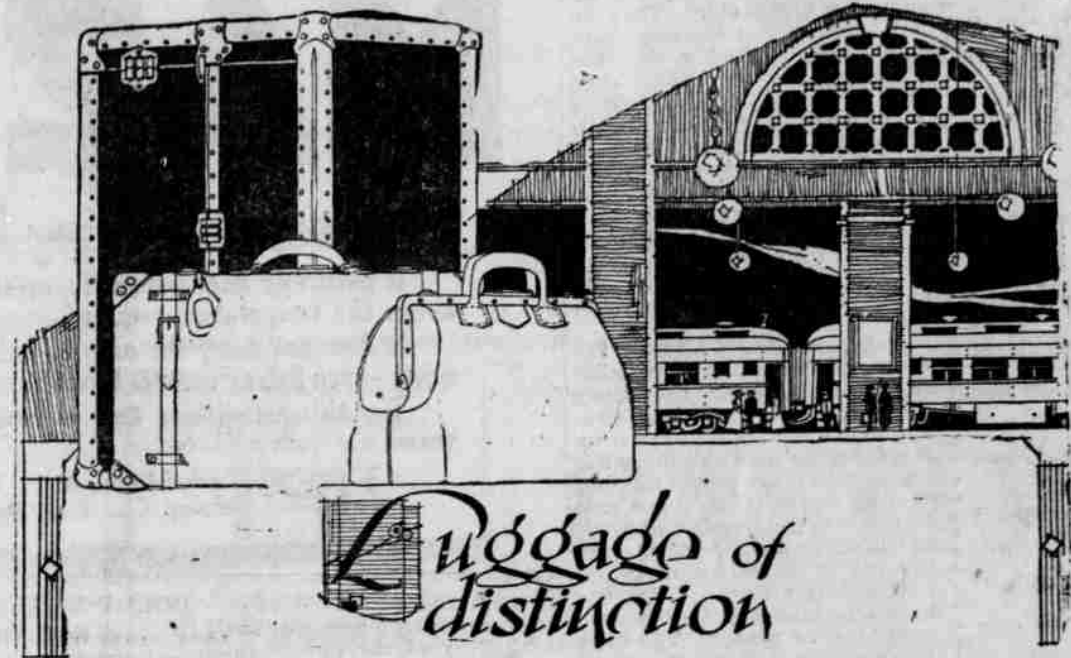
