U. S. OUTBUILDING GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, July 1.—America had twice as much shipping under construction as Great Britain during the first quarter of 1919, according to Lloyd's latest register.

The United States' total of 4,185,523 tons constituted about 75 per cent of the total construction outlaid the United Kingdom. Britain's figure was 2,254,845 tons. The aggregate tonnage under construction in the end of March in both Allied and neutral countries amounted to 7,796,256 tons. British construction included 693 steel steamers totaling 2,249,815 tons and 33 ferro-concrete barges, one motor vessel, and 49 steel sailing ships.

AIRPLANE ROUTE PLANNED FROM ICELAND TO U. S.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—If a large hydroplane alights on surface of the water near the statue of Liberty within the next month or two, only passing attention will be paid to it by onlookers, for the scene will be no unusual or unusual incident to the water front congregation.

But if a patrol boat approaches the strange craft and its skipper sings out to the crew of the plane: "Where y' from, captain?" And the captain answers: "Iceland," the water front boys will have a thrilling yarn to relate for many months to come.

Official advices to Washington state that Iceland intends to establish a regular air service between Reykjavik, its capital, and the eastern ports of the United States. P. A. Olafson, the consul at Reykjavik, is quoted as saying that two hydroplanes, with sufficient power to accomplish a transatlantic flight are already in commission and that a large airplane corporation has been formed to bring about regular aerial voyages between Iceland and the United States. The present one hydroplane will be tried out in the circumnavigation of Iceland.

POLK TO REPLACE LANSING IN PARIS

PARIS, June 30.—Frank Polk, under secretary of state, is scheduled to replace Lansing on the American peace commission when the latter leaves for America. It is learned today. The date of Lansing's sailing has not been fixed.

Berlin Government Arrests Communists

LONDON, June 30.—With order restored by government troops in Hamburg, the Berlin situation is becoming increasingly grave according to dispatches today. Charging conspiracy to start a nationwide revolution the government ordered the arrest of all communist and independent socialist leaders in Berlin.

During a demonstration yesterday soldiers fired on the crowd, killing two men, and two women, and wounding six, according to a Copenhagen dispatch. A bomb exploded outside the ministry of public works, shattering the windows.

A portion of the garrison in the capital expressed a formal desire to quit the city and fear was voiced that if the request was granted the troops might throw down their arms, and refuse to serve longer, leaving the capital inadequately protected in either event.

General Von Lettow, was ready to march upon Hamburg with heavy forces when he was informed the movement was unnecessary, as the city was occupied by government troops yesterday morning without disturbance. The railway strike, according to an unofficial report, now affects 20,000 workmen.

Plane Kills Children As It Ends Long Trip

BOSTON, June 30.—An army bombing airplane piloted by Lieut. Col. H. B. Claggett, struck and killed two children and injured another in landing at Franklin Field to-day. Capt. William E. Chandler, observer on the machine, was slightly hurt. The plane, one of the seven which arrived from Albany on the last leg of a flight from Dallas, was wrecked.
