THE LEAGUE COVENANT

THE PURPOSE:

To discuss and make clear the various articles of the Paris Covenant for a League of Nations, now awaiting ratification by the United States Senate.

Today's Letter Takes Up

ARTICLE IV

The Council

The Council is the principal organ of the League; for while its functions are almost entirely confined to supervision and the making of recommendations, the sphere in which it can do this is large.

Now the responsibility for carrying out the objects of the League rests mainly upon the five larger nations,

On their co-operation its effectiveness depends. Without them it would be powerless. They must be kept constantly in close touch with one another, and hence in the small body which meets most frequently and in which the most intimate conference takes place, they must always be present. But although that body possesses no legal authority to direct the action of the members, yet if it were com-

posed exclusively of the representatives of the five largest nations those five could, if they agreed together, exert such an influence as practically to rule the League, and in fact the whole world. It is important, therefore, that the small states should be represented on the Council, and that the states having seats there should not always be the same. To accomplish this result the Assembly is empowered to select from time to time the states that shall be in the assembly so that the small states will far outnumber the large ones and each state has one vote, the states to have seats smaller members of the League. In order, moreover, that important action affecting any smaller state may not be taken in its absence it is further provided that in such a case the state shall be specially invited to attend. Thus effectiveness by the presence of the larger states is combined with fair consideration for the smaller ones.

No 'Executive' Power

It is noteworthy that in revising the draft of the Covenant the name of the Executive Council was changed to Council, because it is not in fact entrusted with executive power. Apart from matters relating to the organization of the League—such as the appointment of the Secretary General, and of permanent commissions, and the naming, with the approval of the Assembly, of additional members of the Council—its functions are almost wholly advisory or supervisory. Thus it is to formulate plans for reducing armaments, to give advice on restricting the private manufacture of arms and on the means of resisting aggression upon the integrity of a member of the League, to propose steps to give effect to an arbitral award, to formulate plans for a permanent court of justice, to endeavor to effect the settlement of disputes between two members of the League, to conduct inquiries in such cases, to publish facts and recommendations if it fails to reach an effective decision of a dispute, to recommend military contingents in case of an attack upon a member of the League, to make recommendations to prevent hostilities between members, and finally to supervise the prohibition of trade in white slaves, opium, etc., and the administration of international banks.

When Its Action Blocks

The only cases in which the Council has power to take action that has a binding effect of any kind upon the members of the League are three. First, if a plan for a reduction of armaments is voluntarily accepted by the members, no one of them can exceed it during the period for which it has been adopted without the consent of the Council. Second, if in case of an inquiry into a dispute the Council makes a recommendation which is

unanimous (except for the parties thereto) no member of the League can attack another member that complies with it. And third, if a member chooses to accept a mandate over a backward territory it must do so on the terms agreed upon by the members of the League or fixed by the Council. In two other cases the Council has power to take action that has a binding effect, but not on the members of the League. It can determine conditions on which an outside power may join the League, either for the purpose of settling a particular dispute, or permanently, and in this last case it can regulate the military equipment the member of the League may possess.

Not a Super-Sovereign

We may observe that only in matters of procedure and appointment, and in publishing facts and recommendations in a dispute where it cannot make a report with any binding effect, can the Council act by majority. In all other cases, even where it only gives advice, its vote must be unanimous. The only exception is that in deciding a dispute the votes of the parties thereto are not counted. The United States might thus be prevented by act of the Council from attacking a member of the League when all the other members of the Council thought we were in the wrong. Save in that case no action of the Council, which must be unanimous, even the making of recommendations, can take place unless the United States concurs. The fear, therefore, of super-sovereignty, or a Council that rules the world, is the result of inattentive reading of the documents or of an overheated imagination.

MANY DIE IN MEXICAN RIOTS

LAREDO, Tex., June 30.—Many were killed and wounded in three days' rioting in San Luis Potosi, Mex., according to a message the department of justice bureau received today. The riots were the outgrowth of the campaign for rival candidates for governor in the election to be held Friday. Notices were posted in San Luis Potosi warning all Chinese to leave the city immediately. The commander of a small Carranzista garrison warned the Chinese that death was apt to be the penalty for failing to obey the command. The message said the garrison was powerless to cope with the situation. Disorders were widespread throughout the state. Mines are closed and business is at a standstill.

HAND GRENADE BANK SCHEME IS COSTLY

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The sal-

vage corps of the war department threatens to block the hand grenade bank campaign recently announced by the military division of the treasury department. The salvage officials contend that the 15,000,000 empty hand grenades made to blow up Germans, but never filled with explosives after the armistice was signed, are worth 25 cents each as junk, under prevailing high prices. This amounts to \$3,750,000.

The treasury officials want to use them as children's savings banks as a medium for the collection of more than \$60,000,000 to be invested in War Savings Stamps. Each boy or girl under ten years who bought enough Thrift Stamps to get a War Savings Stamp, was to receive a real hand grenade converted into a savings bank. Those from ten to seventeen would have to buy two stamps. The question now to be officially decided is whether the hand grenades have a higher value as souvenirs or as junk.

German Officers Shoot Men to Try To Save Craft

THURSO, Scotland, June 30.—German sailors were shot by their own officers when they attempted to obey the commands of the British officers to return to their ships and shut the seacocks. This statement was

made by Lieut. Nuttall of the steamer Alouette, who reached here today from Scapa Flow, where the German ships were sunk. "I pulled alongside a German destroyer when I saw the ship begin to settle," said Lieut. Nuttall, "and ordered the Germans back to close the seacocks. Four or five of them turned back, whereupon the German officers shot three of them dead. We then opened fire on the officers and several of them dropped."

"Others among the Germans then returned and closed the seacocks. The Germans were also driven back to four or five other destroyers. They closed the seacocks in time to keep the vessels afloat."

Lieut. Nuttall reports that the Emden has been pumped out and is now afloat. The Baden's crew were forced back to that vessel and compelled to shut the seacocks. "Directly the first red flag and German ensign were hoisted on the first battleship," he added, "the German Admiral put off in a motor boat haste to the British air station ashore. He stated that the ships were sinking, and requested assistance for the crews. The Admiral was arrested. Naval men believe that the trip was a ruse to lead to the belief that the crews were taking charge of the ships. This, however, was not substantiated by what actually happened."

MYSTERIOUS GIRL BEING SOUGHT FOR ALLEGED BURGLARY

SPOKANE, Wash., June 30.—San Francisco police want Sybil Smith, alias Lillian Davis the "mystery girl," for burglary. Lillian was identified here Tuesday as the daughter of George D. Smith of Seattle. She is held in the city jail on a larceny charge after baffling the police for weeks.

Late yesterday afternoon Captain of Detectives Burns received a telegraphic warrant for the girl. San Francisco authorities, however, had made a mixup in the description. Burns said, and he is awaiting fingerprints before placing the new charge against her. "We think that it's Lillian they want all right," said Burns. Lillian's father in a letter to the local police, says she is unbalanced.

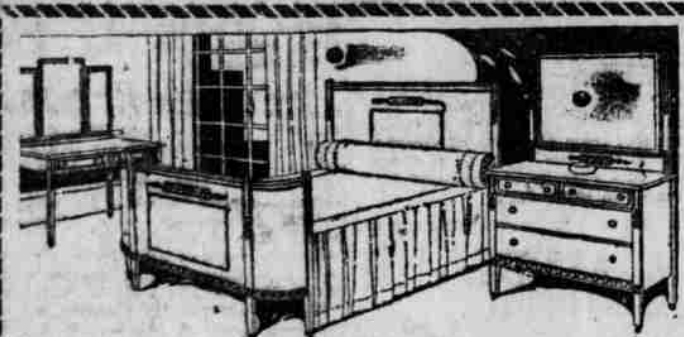
