

CONGRESS MAY NOT BACK COAST ROAD

Representative McArthur
Says That Military Need
of Road Must Be Shown

WASHINGTON, July 8.—Representative McArthur, in a statement to the Journal Washington bureau, on the Roosevelt highway, says he will support it heartily. "There are many difficulties before a congressional appropriation can be secured. Congress is pledged to a program of strict economy, and will appropriate funds only where an imperative need is shown. There is no warrant of law for this appropriation. Consequently, the hands of the appropriation committee are tied."

"Necessary authority will be granted if the highway bill becomes a law. This bill is in the hands of the committee on roads and a hearing will be held in a few days. It will be necessary to prove the highway is necessary from a military standpoint, and is not purely local in character."

"The delegation will leave nothing undone in urging favorable action, but cannot compel me to say it will be no easy task to secure the necessary funds from congress."

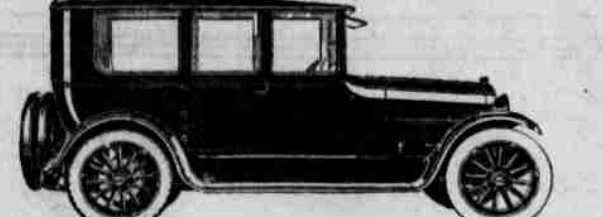

PROSPERITY REPLACES POVERTY IN BIG CITIES

Clean faced, smiling children, dressed in white and well fed through the ghetto districts of eastern cities now in place of undernourished, ill clothed and unhappy looking youngsters of a few years ago, says Sol Baum, Pendleton sporting goods dealer, who is just back from a trip to Chicago. Poverty is almost unknown in the big cities, Mr. Baum declares.

The middle west and east is experiencing the greatest prosperity in history and every person who will work is employed at good pay, he said. The factories have more orders than they hope to fill for months, they cannot get help enough to operate to full capacity as they would, and are paying higher wages than have ever been known. The industrial prosperity and the lessening of crime and intemperance are both tending to lift up those who for years have been among the unfortunate.

ESTHER CHAPMAN DROWNED IN LAKE

Body of Portland Girl is
Found Near Spot Where
She Was Last Seen.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—The body of Esther Chapman, the 9 year old daughter by adoption of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Chapman of 1022 1/2 Hawthorne avenue, was found in the west end of Oswego Lake by a party of grapplers headed by Hugh Brady, and her father, at 11:30 o'clock this morning. The body was recovered near where she was last seen at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Lodged in a little hole in the shallow sands slightly beyond the stone pier at the end of the lake, the little body was found in water barely beyond the child's depth.

City Grappler Hugh Brady, complying with requests of Lake Grove residents and the parents, went to the scene of the strange disappearance this morning and had been working for less than two hours when the body was brought to the surface.

Theories Are Disputed.

Finding of the body dispelled all the various theories that had been advanced to account for the girl's disappearance. Searching parties both in this section of the lake and in the surrounding woods, had seemingly scoured the country and the lake bottom so thoroughly that it was believed impossible the child could be anywhere near that section.

PEACH, APRICOT PRICES KEEP PACE AT WILTON

The peach and apricot crop in the Milton-Freewater district is doing very well with prices keeping pace with those paid for other fruits and berries so far this year, George A. Price, of Milton, said today. Mr. Price, who is a director in the First National Bank, is in the city to attend to some land deals.

Virtually all the cherries have been sold at record prices for this year and blackberries and raspberries are now being shipped. Weather conditions have been favorable for all fruits, according to Mr. Price, and the valley in the east end is in a prosperous shape.

Paving of the highway toward the state line from Freewater is also coming along well and the stretch is expected to be completed before long. The road from Milton to Pendleton was found in good shape also, the trip requiring only one hour and a quarter by car.

UMATILLA MAY HAVE FIRST COUNTY Y MAN

Pendleton Has Raised All
But \$400 of \$2250
Allotment.

Umatilla county bids fair to be the first county in Oregon to have a county Y. M. C. A. secretary, according to John H. Rudd, interstate secretary for county work of the Y. M. C. A., here from Portland. Pendleton has raised all but \$400 of its \$2250 quota and several of the county towns have raised the entire amount allotted to them.

With W. P. Walter, district secretary, Mr. Rudd has spent yesterday and today soliciting certain local precincts untouched by their committee heads. In every instance they have been rewarded with subscriptions and checks, not pledges, given. Both men feel encouraged at the showing they have been able to make and predict that with a little personal solicitation the prescribed amount will be raised and a secretary installed in the county in time to take up work in the fall.

Yveston has sent in a check for its full amount and Freewater also has raised its quota. Hermiston, in the west end, has met its quota and is waiting for the other county towns to do the same and allow the system to be instituted. Other towns had to give up the soliciting work when having begun and little progress is expected until after the harvest.

New Auto Top Patented By Walla Walla Man

W. L. Bessolo, Walla Walla inventor has been granted a patent for a new auto shade or top, which is different from those now in use, in that it is fastened from the front instead of the rear, thereby permitting a more free circulation of air and permitting the dust to pass beyond the car instead of collecting in the tonneau, as is now the case.

Mr. Bessolo already has had attractive offers for the purchase outright of this patent, but has declined them, according to the Bulletin. He is now in Spokane but is expected home soon.

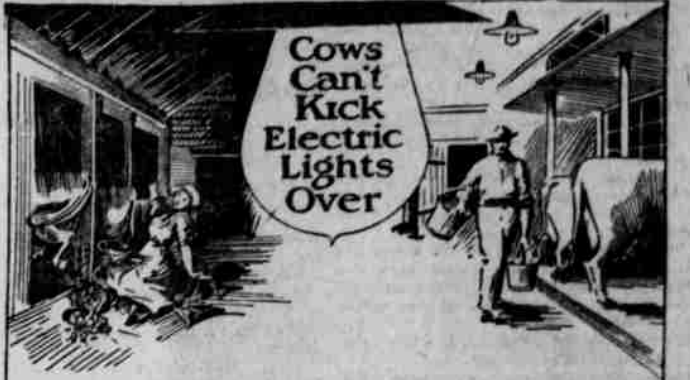
