PARIS ACTORS FORM REAL TRADE UNION

PARIS, July 7.—The actors and singers of the Paris stage have decided to form a regular trades union, to be affiliated to the general labor federation and so compelled to take part in any strike ordered by that body.

This machinists, electricians and other employees of the theater and music halls have been unionized for some time. The new union will try to establish a minimum salary of \$4 a day with payment during rehearsals.

DISTRUST OF AMERICA FANNED BY CARRANZA

U. S. Pictured as Dollar Hog Feeding Upon Neighbors.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Reports are received from Central American tries that President Carranza of Mexico is doing his utmost to instill distrust of the United States in Salvador, Honduras, Costa Rica and Nicaragua.

According to the alleged plan of Carranza, Guatemala whose Government has consistently held aloof from Mexican intrigue, is to be crushed between Mexico and the rest of Central America.

Salvador and Honduras have not been won over to Carranza's side, although the reports indicate they show an inability in regard to Mexico which is considered hostile to the United States. Costa Rica, under Tinoco, whom the United States refused to recognize, is on the side of Mexico.

Nicaragua is disliked by her neighbors for having courted the favor of the United States. The economic advantage that Nicaragua is beginning to reap as a result of the adoption of a non-military government and the policy of paying her debts is worrying the other Central American countries on which Carranza is declared to be working. The other countries argue that it is better to be poor and independent than wealthy and dependent.

Carranza is seeking to make Central American peoples believe that they are in danger of encroachments by the United States, using Nicaragua as an example. The United States is represented as a greedy, conscienceless neighbor, "a great big hog constantly feeding on dollars."

A curious development is the fact that both Salvador and Honduras have sent special missions to study the new Nicaraguan system.

Labor Aims to Quit Work. PARIS, July 7.—The executive committee of the General Labor Federation announces that, after conferring with British and Italian "comrades," plans are being laid for an international labor manifestation July 21, when there will be a complete stoppage of all work in France and Italy.

The objects of the demonstration, it is said, are the "cessation of armed intervention in Russia, the rapid demobilization of armies, the revocation

SWEDEN DEMANDS PLEBISCITE ON ALAND ISLANDS' FUTURE

STOCKHOLM, July 7.—The Swedish government in replying to a note from the government of Finland, insists that the question of the future of the Aland Islands (in the Gulf of Bothnia between Sweden and Finland), shall be settled by a plebiscite.

It is declared that if the Finnish government does not wish to negotiate on the basis proposed in the Swedish note of November, 1918, Sweden will put the question to the Peace Conference.
