Aviators Take up Important Matter of Mapping the American Air.

NEW YORK, July 14.—Unquestionably, we who have passed through the stone, bronze, iron, steel ages and are now passing through the age of steam and gasoline are now entering upon a new age—the Age of the Air,” said a well known official of the Aero Club of America.

Recently, at the second Pan-American Aeronautic Congress in Atlantic City, the problem of airways over land and sea was taken up and regulations and a new age—the Age of the Air,” said a well known official of the Aero Club of America.

As definite in these regulations an “Airway” is a transcontinental or coastal airway; connecting links between are designated “Air Routes.” An airway is a belt eight miles wide, an air route forty miles wide. The congress selected a number of these routes, great care being taken to avoid the most dangerous enemies of the airman—mist and fog, not wind.

This Pan-American Aeronautic Congress has also approved a bill which will be introduced in the present congress for the regulation of civilian flying. This bill is said to have the approval of President Wilson and Secretary of Commerce Redfield. It creates an Aircraft Board in the Department of Commerce, consisting of

three men, named by the Secretary of Commerce. Two of these men shall have had practical experience in the construction and operation of airplanes and the third in the construction and operation of dirigibles.

Almost simultaneously with the meeting of the second Pan-American Aeronautic Congress in Atlantic City, the International Aeronautical Federation was holding a session in Paris. The purpose of their meeting was to try to obtain uniform air laws to rule the conduct of flying throughout the world.

Principles Laid Down.
The delegates voted to present to the officials in charge of aerial affairs of their respective governments the following proposals:

First—That the liberty of aerial navigation be re-established as soon as possible in conformity with the decision of the peace conference.
Second—That civilian aeronautics in the various countries be placed under the control of the Aviation Ministry or Department.

Third—That all the aero clubs affiliated with the International Federation be represented on the International Commission on Aeronautical Navigation, which is to be created after peace is signed.

Fourth—That in every country the National Aero Club be represented in the National Commission on Aeronautics.

COMMITTED ALREADY

(New York World.)
If the Hon. Hiram Johnson and Reade who in their opposition to the League of Nations are shrieking that “our American boys must not be sent to the ends of the earth to fight other people's battles” will pardon the interruption, we should say that that is precisely what we have engaged to do in several instances. Their statement that we are to be ordered about by foreign nations is, of course, not true.

These flaming evangelists of a cloistered life for the Great Republic are powerful champions of the Monroe Doctrine, which they are afraid we are on the point of abandoning. Yet the Monroe Doctrine, embodied in no treaty and embraced by no law, is a standing notice that our boys will be sent to fight for wherever it may be violated. It has been interpreted in many ways, but from the day in 1823 to the present hour there has never been a time when if monarchy had undertaken to subvert democracy on this hemisphere our armies would not have been in operation anywhere from the Rio Grande to Cape Horn, and in the very realms of European royalty if necessary.

When we purchased Alaska in 1867 we sent our boys there to protect property and people, and they have been going and coming ever since. The same thing is true of Hawaii, which we annexed in 1898, and of the Philippine Islands, which came under our jurisdiction in 1899. In the last twenty years tens of thousands of our boys have crossed and recrossed the Pacific Ocean on just such errands as might devolve upon them by our own consent under the covenant of the League of Nations.

There are two classical examples of national obligation to use our boys in behalf of other peoples nearer home. By the Platt amendment to an Army Appropriation Bill we guaranteed the independence of Cuba, liberated by our forces from Spanish oppression, and required the new republic to recognize in its Constitution the right of the United States to intervene for the preservation of life, freedom and property. One notable occasion in 1906 our boys were ordered to the island in considerable numbers to carry out this policy.

We are committed in like manner at the Isthmus. To enable the little Republic of Panama, established by our connivance and in violation of our treaty with New Granada (now Colombia), of which it was a part, to fulfill its engagements with us as to the canal and its defenses, the United States has guaranteed the sovereignty of Panama forever and has agreed to give it much material support meaning money and guns, as may be required to prevent any encroachments upon its territory.

The American people are thus committed in all parts of the world to the use of their soldier and sailor boys in behalf of liberty. Next to liberty nothing

appeals to them more strongly than peace, which is the basis of liberty, as it is the one great purpose of the League of Nations. What do Senatorial slackers expect to gain by falsifying or refusing to recognize the truth?
