County, Ore. The exposure of the trip gave Dr. Buffum a severe cold, and he returned to Walla Walla one day sooner than he had expected. After his return he was taken to a hospital where death occurred yesterday.

Pouring of concrete for the new Collins mill building is progressing according to schedule and the first story will have been completed by the middle of the coming week, it was estimated today. The foundation work has been completed and the structure will rise rapidly from now on. Every indication is that the building

will be completed and ready for the installation of machinery by October 1. A full force of men is at work on the building.

W. W. Harrah Cutting Grain.

Harvesting on a portion of the W. W. Harrah wheat ranch has begun and the yield is running better than 15 bushels, although it is in light land. Mr. Harrah has about 200 acres in spring wheat which will be ripe in a couple of weeks. This will give about 15 bushels also, Mr. Harrah believes.

More Men Than Jobs Now.

There are about three harvest hands available for every harvest job open at this time, according to N. Berkeley, who is continuing the free employment bureau formerly operated by the government. The men came in early this year but there will be enough work for all as soon as harvesting becomes general.

Bear Makes Havoc in Sheep Camp.

"Boots" Matthews, who is in Pendleton today, reports that a bear invaded his sheep camp on Meadow Creek recently and created such havoc that he describes the condition of the camp similar to that of a French village hit by a German bombardment. The bear was hungry and made merry with the herder's supplies.

First Issue Reaches Pendleton.

Several copies of Volume 1, No. 1 of the American Legion Weekly, the official publication of the American Legion, were received today by the Pendleton Commercial Association. The magazine contains 32 pages of news articles and notes about the legion and among the contributors is Rupert Hughes, Christy Mathewson, Admiral Sims, Walter Camp, Lord Northcliffe, Henry Woodhouse and Briggs, the cartoonist. A story of the organization meeting at St. Louis is one of the principal articles.

Navy Attracts Recruit.

The new ruling that men may enlist in the navy for as short time as two years is attracting recruits. Alfred Arnold Neimets, of Nellville, Wisconsin, and Claire Campbell, of Anacosta, Montana, signed up yesterday with Recruiting Officer M. Rullison for two years as apprentice seamen. They chose Chicago as a training place. Harold Douglas Orton of Walla Walla, who has been in the Canadian army for the past three years and a half, decided today to try Uncle Sam's navy and enlisted for three years as an apprentice seaman. He will also go to Chicago to train.

Combed Nation for Connors.

Evidence that Sheriff T. D. Taylor was anxious to apprehend Charles Connors, Haines bank robber and escaped Umatilla county prisoner, is conveyed in the front page spread in the current issue of Detective, a national magazine. On the first page are two pictures of Connors, his finger prints and signatures and a complete description. A reward of \$50 was also posted for his capture. Connors, however, was taken into custody by officials of Baker after being caught at San Francisco. The ad appeared two days after his capture.

Wheat of Clean Grade This Year.

Arrivals of wheat of the new crop from the interior are shown in Portland and the quality is the best known for many years. That there was a cleaner crop than has been known for at least five years has been known for some time, but the trade itself is somewhat elated over the fact that the percentage of smutty stock is even less than had been anticipated. New crop wheat arrivals not only are of heavy weight, but the berries are plump and full, and the color is excellent. It is now figured that far the greater per cent of the crop will grade No. 1 quality this season.

Laing Estate Is Probated.

The estate of Robert Laing, deceased, was admitted to probate today and James T. Laing was named administrator. Mr. Laing died without leaving a will but he left property estimated worth \$55,000. Real property includes three quarter sections of land in the county, valued at \$25,000, city property worth \$10,000, and stock in the American National Bank worth a like sum. Several copies of the new Oregon game laws, as brought up to time by the 1919 legislature, were received by County Clerk R. T. Brown today for distribution to interested sportsmen. The booklet is a complete compendium of all the laws relating to game and fish and contains 95 pages. It is free.

M. D. O'Connell, publisher of the Hermiston Herald, is defendant in an action for divorce brought today by Mrs. Mina O'Connell through her attorneys, Haley, Haley & Stehler and H. J. Warner. Mrs. O'Connell charges desertion and non-support. They have three sons, 17, 11 and 9 years old respectively and for their support Mrs. O'Connell asks \$100 a month.

Grain Car Rules Kept.

War time regulations that necessitated permits being issued for the movement of grain will continue in force, according to a decision reached at a recent gathering of railroaders in Seattle, called by L. C. Gillman, district director of the U. S. railroad administration. There will be district grain control committees at Seattle and Portland, and grainmen when making application for cars in which to move the cereal must first obtain a permit from the committee. The system is being depended upon to eliminate a general car shortage in the northwest by expediting the movement of grain.

Pool to be Filled Today.

Owing to the bottom of the pool being lower than the river, a pump was recently installed to let out all the water and the job of cleaning the tank is necessarily slow. It is expected that the pool will be ready for use today.

Half of Improvement Finished.

The east half of the Sturges & Storle implement store on East Court street has been finished by the contractor making the improvements and work has begun on the remodeling of the west half, originally occupied by the firm before McCook & Bentley sold out. It will be several weeks before the entire job is completed.
