VAST TREASURE ARE TAKEN FROM GERMANY

Securities Smuggled Out to Save Owners from Sharing War Indemnities.

BERLIN (By Mail).—Switzerland and the Scandinavian countries at present house a vast treasure in German and Austrian securities. Their worth can only be guessed, but it is estimated that they run into many millions of dollars.

These securities have been smuggled out of Austria and Germany against the time when their owners would have to help pay the German war indemnities. Because of the movement of these valuable papers, the German government made strong complaint in the course of the peace negotiations. It pointed out that a vast sum of money had gone out of the country, which, without the aid of the assets in recovering, probably could not be reached.

To Escape Peace Duty
The securities were taken out by wealthy men who desired to escape their share of the burdens arising from peace payments. In some cases, airplanes were used to take out great stores of securities. In other cases, directly after the armistice, it was possible for the wealthy to pack up their tangible assets and move quietly into Switzerland, or some other neutral country, where the securities were safely stowed away out of the reach of the German government.

Only today there came news from Vienna of a considerable movement of Austrian and Hungarian paper out of the country. One estimate was that recently \$1,000,000,000 worth of notes and other securities had been smuggled out of the country—with quite evident signs that the movement had the same purpose behind it as the earlier German smuggling.

Neutrals Profit.
The government is now seeing to it that no great sums of money or paper are allowed to slip through the boundaries unless for legitimate purposes. Germany complains that her ability to meet foreign claims has been materially decreased by the acts of war-savvy profiteers and wealthy citizens who chose to take their wealth away rather than aid in rebuilding Germany wherein these profits were made.

Incidentally, Switzerland and the other neutral countries, have made vast profits through the war; while the access of wealthy Germans with their fortunes makes money flow rather freely. Switzerland has been for some time the playground of Europe, owing to the closing of other resorts on account of the war. It is now necessary to obtain special permits to enter the country for pleasure or business purposes.

Richard's chopmill which has been undergoing extensive alterations and improvements will be completed in time to take care of the harvest busi-

ness, the Athena Press reports. The capacity of the mill has been increased and the facilities for receiving, handling and storing grain improved. Workmen are installing the elevators, grain bins and machinery.

Plans for enlarging and generally improving the Joseph stockyards have been approved by the head officials of the railroad and work on construction and repairs will commence at an early date, the Herald learns. Two pens, 50 by 100 feet each, will be added.

The Helix Milling Company has let the contract for a storage warehouse for flour and other products, according to the Advocate. A carload of lumber for the new structure has arrived and a carload of cement is expected daily. It is expected to have the warehouse completed before the fall rush begins.

Due to the great demand for residential property in Milton at the present time a condition which might well be termed a house shortage now prevails the Eagle says. In former years, and especially at this season, a number of houses were made vacant by farmers who would move to the farms for summer and to the city in winter to be close to school. This season the tide has turned and houses for rent are at premium.

Hermiston is soon to have a new shoe store carrying stocks for men, women and children, the Herald reports. It will be in the building formerly occupied by Jack White's cleaning establishment.

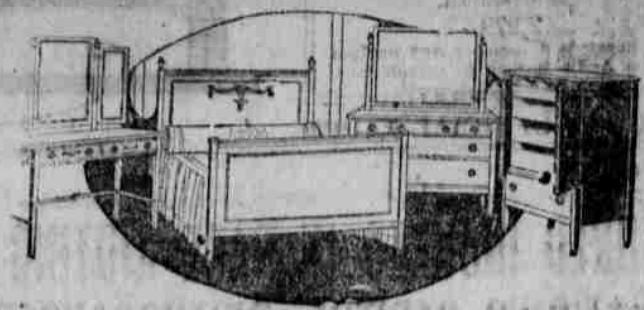

Organizing Ability

The work of the federation is now being directed by a national committee of prominent business women, selected from as widely varying localities as possible, in order that each section of the country will be represented. Women, contrary to the general opinion, are born organizers. For years they had only the Epitaph church social to expend their organization talents upon, but the church socials have always raised the desired money. It may be noticed. Then they tackled the clubs and organized the educative campaigns. And when suffrage came along, they built up an organization that many a politician envied. The states have been divided into five sec-

tions, each in charge of a capable trained national organizer, whose work has been directed toward the federation of the various states from which are to come the delegates to the national federation.
