Plans for a matatorium 100 by 208 feet, with a pool 46 by 120 feet, have been completed at Baker and the question is soon to be settled by the citizens. Water from Sam-O springs, a mineral spring, is proposed for the pool and the overflow is to be run into an artificial lake where boating will be indulged in. Estimates of costs will be reported at the next meeting of the Baker commissioners.

Heating Plant Contract Awarded.
R. H. Thompson was last night awarded the contract to install a hot water heating system in the Hawthorne school. The contract price is \$5000 and work will begin at once. Hot water was decided upon because of belief of board members that it is more sanitary and more satisfactory than hot air. Bids on hot air systems were slightly lower. Other bids, calling for various school improvements and repairs, will be opened Friday night.

Forest Official Here. **N. M. Kavanagh**, of the U. S. forest office in Portland, arrived in Pendleton today to confer with **W. W. Cryder**, Unatilla forest supervisor. Mr. Kavanagh is going to John Day to oversee the work of the fire fighters in the forest fires of that section. He says that the fire conditions are especially serious this year, as August is the month in which forest fires usually break out, and the fires in July have heretofore been negligible. Thus the work of the fire fighters has started a month earlier than in previous years.

Pilot Rock Banker in Town.
Louis C. S. Scharpf, cashier of the First Bank of Pilot Rock, is in Pendleton on business today. Mr. Scharpf just returned from a visit to Portland and was a member of a party of 21 that climbed to the summit of Mount Hood last Sunday. It takes nearly 12 hours to make the ascent, he said. The party was with camped at the snow line from 11 until 2 in the morning and after cooking breakfast on the snow started the ascent at 3 a. m. The summit was reached at noon but the view from there was well worth the experience, he declared.

New Attachment Makes Two Machines
A new truck attachment which permits use of the motor unit of a Ford for truck purposes when needed and can be changed back to a passenger car in two hours is being introduced in the Umatilla county field by the Hline Mountain Motor Co. The arrangement is known as the Mars truck attachment and when installed on a Ford makes a one ton truck. Recent tests with sheet showed that it will haul one and a half tons easily. The parts are so standardized that when the truck is not needed, the passenger body of the car can be changed back in two hours. The Mars attachment, unlike other Ford truck attachments, is of the Torbinson type of drive, patterned after that used on Republic trucks.
