STRAUS CREDITED WITH AMBITION TO RULE JERUSALEM

NEW YORK, July 24.—Nathan Straus, New York merchant and philanthropist, wants to be the first mayor of Jerusalem if the peace conference sits aside Palestine. A Jewish nation, according to officers of the Zionist organization here, who may be confided his wishes to them, Straus several months ago announced his intention of returning to Jerusalem and devoting his fortune to the welfare

of the population.

Man is 115 or 130 Years Old, Nobody Sure Just Which

LEXINGTON, Ky., July 24.—The National Geographic Society has been asked officially to investigate the claim that John Shell, who lives on Ogeesay Creek, in Leslie county, is the oldest man in the world. He admits being 115 years old. Henry Chappel,

himself 70 years old, says Shell was an old man back as far as he can remember, and that he has a tax ticket showing payment of taxes by the old man in 1899, which would make the latter at least 130 or 131 years old. Shell's oldest children are now about 30 years old, and he has several great grandchildren grown up. He has about nine children living.

He attributes his long and vigorous life to his outdoor living, hunting mostly, and to his temperate habits. He never drank or used tobacco to excess at any time in his life. NEW ALASKAN ROAD BENEFITS ALL COAST

Taps Two Coal Fields, Cuts Travel Time for Freight and Reduces Prices.

JUNEAU, Alaska, July 24.—"The Alaskan railroad, now 75 per cent complete, will be of wonderful benefit to Alaska in improving industrial conditions, and thus will the whole Pacific coast be benefited by increased trade," declared Thomas Riggs, Jr., governor of Alaska, today.

The governor nullified as false the charges that lax methods are being used in constructing the road.

"The road is being well and economically constructed, no matter what ulterior-motive attacks have been made thereon," he said.

The railroad extends from Seward, an ice-free port, to Fairbanks—a distance of 471 miles. Necessary branches bring the total mileage to over 550, according to Riggs.

Taps Coal Fields.

"When complete, the railroad will serve a long-felt want," said the governor. "It may not for years pay maintenance and operating charges, but it will gradually open up a territory rich in mining and farming opportunities. Two coal fields are tapped. The principal one—the Matanuska field—holds promise of being an export field for high grade bituminous coal, in which the Pacific coast is lacking. The Nenana lignite field will supply the interior country with fuel for industrial and domestic purposes, displacing wood, which is rapidly disappearing from around the more settled districts.

Cuts Travel Time.

"Not the least function performed will be found in cutting down of time consumed in travel and in constant service rendered. As it is now, it takes freight about a month to travel from Seattle to Fairbanks, and this only during the season of open-river navigation. With the railroad in operation, freight will land in Fairbanks within a week from that date of shipping. There will be no large stocks on hand subject to market fluctuations, deterioration, insurance, overstock and loss. High prices will be reduced by the limitation of such unfavorable factors, and a constant supply of seasonable supplies is assured. A dredgerman now, in case of a breakdown, with no spare part on hand, for instance, must close his operations for the season and lay off a crew, perhaps brought all the way under pay from the states. With the railroad operation, within a week the part can be replaced and the boat placed once more in operation."

Governor Riggs emphasized the immense distances involved. "Imagine all the routes east of the Mississippi river as being without a railroad," he said, "dependent almost entirely upon navigable waters as highways with a source of supply in England. You can include in your picture a wagon road impassable for a part of the year between Pittsburgh and Philadelphia and a 'Jerk-water' railroad between Baltimore and New York. It was conditions like these that caused the secretary of the interior to take up and push through the Alaska railroad project."

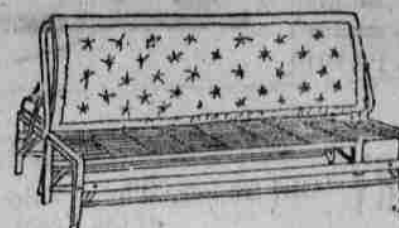

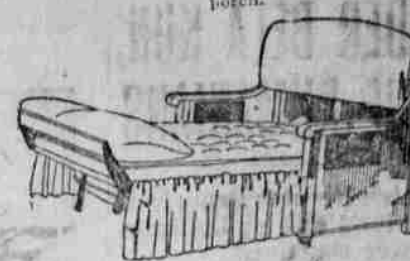
