Petition in New York To Impeach President Passed Anonymously

NEW YORK, July 24.—A newspaper correspondent yesterday came into possession of an eight-page pamphlet, five pages of which are devoted to "a petition for the impeachment of Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States." The remainder contains an argument in support of the petition, a poem and a page of lined space for signatures.

The publication, which is being quietly distributed, is anonymous and contains nothing by which the author's identity can be established. The petition, written in legal form, is a bitter arraignment of the president and his policies.

"We charge him here with a kind of anarchy that is subversive of all human relationship based upon understanding or agreement, since the anarchy with which we now charge him threatens the destruction of society itself, through the destruction of the integrity of human speech—the spoken and written word—the medium by which men enter into social relationship and enter all moral relationship with each other."

"Upon investigation it was found that the pamphlet had been printed by the Donnelly Press at 164 East Thirty-seventh street, and a reporter found there J. Donnelly, owner."

"I took this job just the same as I would take any other order," he said. "I have known for some time the man who dictated the order, but it would be unwise to name him, and I would object to talking to you. I shall see him tomorrow and if he agrees I will make an appointment with him for you."

"He is an American born and bred, and is substantial. So far as I know he has nothing in common with the Bolsheviks or with those intent upon freeing Ireland."

On the back page of the pamphlet is a paragraph urging all citizens who approve the petition to sign it and send it either to "your representative in congress or to the speaker of the house of representatives." The recipients are urged to get others to sign.

BRITISH UNION LABOUR PLANNING TO STRIKE AGAINST PARLIAMENT

LONDON, July 25.—A strike against the government and parliament is being planned by the trade unions, in order to demonstrate their strength without disadvantage to the workers,

the parliamentary correspondent of the Daily Express discloses. The plan is to call out all members of trade unions employed in the houses of parliament and in the various government offices. The unions could thus stop the printing of official reports and debates, as well as all government reports and could interrupt the whole legislative business.

Geologists to Examine Proposed Site for Big Central Oregon Project

BEND, July 26.—Detailed examination of the land in the Benham falls storage reservoir site was started by government geologists, headed by Professor W. C. Crosby of Boston.

Large ship augers are used in the work, and borings 20 feet in depth are being made over the entire tract to ascertain whether the soil is of a

character which will permit water stored in the basin to escape. Wells in the Deschutes valley, nine to 20 miles from Bend, where the investigations are being carried on, show a constant supply of water, but it is intended to make the findings on this point absolutely definite.

If conditions are found favorable, reclamation service for the construction of a dam to impound water sufficient for the irrigation of 100,000 acres in central Oregon will be made.

A general survey of the reservoir sites of this section of the state was completed yesterday afternoon by the geologists. At Twin lakes a typical glacial formation, similar to that in northern Minnesota, was found.

Letter From Yank Trails Death Wire To Springs Mother

COLORADO SPRINGS, July 24.—Receiving a telegram announcing the death of her son in the army of occupation in Germany one day and a letter from the son himself, written on the day he is said to have died, the next day, is the experience that has happened to Mrs. Irah M. Shellenberger, 19 McKinley place. Tuesday she received a telegram from Adjutant-General Harris at Washington stating that her son Philip E. Shellenberger, first sergeant in an evacuation ambulance company at Trier, Germany, had died of hemorrhages on June 25. Wednesday a letter from her son dated June 25 was delivered to her. He said that he was enjoying the best of health and hoped to return to this country soon. Mrs. Shellenberger is at loss to account for the conflicting reports and hopes to hear definite news from her son within the next two or three days.

Young Shellenberger, who was an employee of the Retail Drug company before he entered the army in December, 1917, embarked for France November 11, the day the armistice was signed. Upon his arrival overseas he was sent to Germany as an unattached member of the medical corps of the army of occupation and has been stationed at Trier since that time.

Charged to Himself

MAJORITY OF JEWS OPPOSE BOLSHIEVISM

Merchants Lost Fortunes; Others Promoted to High Places in Government.

NEW YORK, July 26.—Bolshevism is not a revolution by the Russian Jews for the Russian Jews, as is popularly believed, according to the bolsheviks. Investigating the way the Jews line up with regard to bolshevism leads to the conclusion three-fourths of the Jews are against bolshevism.

This stand on the part of the majority of Jews is probably due to the fact that the Jews have been the heaviest losers among the little bourgeoisie of Russia. This is especially true of small cities. In the provincial districts most of the Jews were buyers and sellers and had gathered together small fortunes, usually from five to twenty-five thousand rubles. Today that sum is nothing, but in the old days it represented quite an amount, comparatively speaking, enough to enable operation of a small business.

Lost Fortunes Generally the Jewish merchant lost this fortune entirely, through confiscations of stocks in stores or of warehouses of wool and cotton and grains. It was the Jew who lost heaviest because he had most. Why fortunes of merchants were confiscated, either without payment or at low prices set by the state, the peasant was allowed to sell at market prices. Confiscation was not attempted with the peasant, who was regarded as a producer.

A typical case was cited to the attention of the correspondent while he was interviewing the chief of the economic soviet in Moscow. Two Jews from the provinces reached Moscow and immediately put their case before the soviet for decision. They had been sent by the merchants of their village, almost all Jews, all of whom were required to give up wool and other goods they had invested in at a price set by the government. The peasants, on the other hand, were allowed to sell at a competitive price.

What the result of the protest was, the correspondent could not learn, since it had to be passed along to several soviet and numerous yards of red tape had to be unrolled before the matter could be solved. Probably the goods were confiscated before the decision could be altered.

Similarly in all towns the Jews have lost the small shops which have been closed by the bolsheviks. The Jews were the ones who lost their means of support, and had to go to work at new places. The Jewish rabbi has been against bolshevism from the beginning and, have exercised a great influence over their people.

Some Become Leaders On the other hand, it is true that a large percentage of Jewish intellectuals, mostly men who have been the victims of the old government, have become leaders in the bolshevik movement.

This has been explained by the fact that under the old regime Jews were prevented from entering certain other lines of activity by laws which discriminated against the Hebrews. The Jews naturally took to intellectual pursuits and became writers, lawyers, and thinkers. They welcomed any system which would guarantee them an equal opportunity. These intellectuals quickly adjusted themselves to the bolshevik ideas, and owing to their keenness and energy, many came out on top in the new government.

That the majority of bolsheviks are Jews is not true, it is evident. Probably they have a larger percentage of representation in government positions than the Gentiles, but every effort is made by the soviet government to prevent the issue from arising.

The bolsheviks are trying to prevent discrimination from being made against the Jews, and have succeeded remarkably well. The principal Jewish problem seems to be along the borders, where the armies are fighting. There the reported "pogroms" are causing bitter feeling. According to the bolsheviks, the "pogroms," resulting in the massacre of entire villages, are confined to the anti-bolshevik side of the line. The worst Jewish "pogroms" have been in the south, mostly in the Ukraine. Many villages of Jews have been wiped out, according to the best information available.

WASHINGTON, OREGON TO GET GUARD UNITS

WASHINGTON, July 26.—Units of the national guard authorized for the present fiscal year in the states of Oregon and Washington, and for the support of which federal funds will be available, are practically the same as to numerical strength, and largely similar in character.

Four companies of coast artillery, one regiment of infantry, and one battery of field artillery are authorized in each state. For Oregon, in addition, are one company of engineers, one ambulance company and one troop of cavalry, while Washington is allotted one wire signal company, one field hospital company and one machine-gun troop.

The allotment for California provides nine companies of coast artillery, one regiment of infantry, one battalion of field artillery, one battalion of engineers, one radio signal company, two troops of cavalry, one field hospital company and one ambulance company.

For failure to pay \$600, an alimony, Willard F. Brown was today cited by the circuit court to appear July 28 to show cause why he should not be held in contempt of court. Mr. Brown was ordered to pay that sum to Minnie A. Brown, who was granted a divorce from him three years ago. She alleges that he had two years in which to pay the money but has not deposited any part of the \$600 with the clerk of the court.

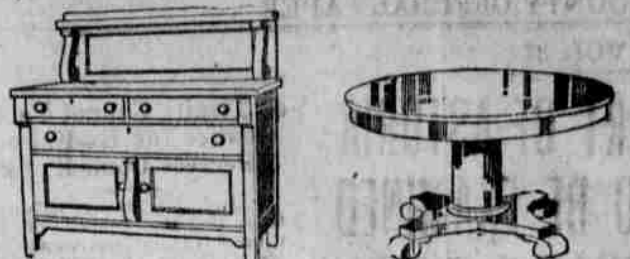
