Dr. Lytle Leaves for Salem.
Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, left today for Salem after a business visit in Pendleton.

Jack McDonald returned yesterday after service in the United States navy, having received an honorable discharge. He has made several trips across the ocean and has been stationed on the Imperator.

Paving to Be Resumed.
Paving from the Adams plant will be resumed Monday, it is announced by Pat Loneragan, manager of the Warren Construction Co. The plant was burned out a week ago Sunday and since that time new parts have been sent in so that operations may be resumed in the next few days. Work will be pushed on the road when operations are resumed.

Geary Kimbrell Returns.
Geary Kimbrell, formerly county engineer, returned yesterday from southern Utah, where he has been engaged in work as a federal highway engineer. He was forced to leave his new location because of the high altitude of 8000 feet, which, coupled with the strenuous work, has made Mr. Kimbrell ill. He was ordered home and expects to be transferred to a new position which will be in a more healthful climate.

Paul Baker, alleged Pasco post office robber, was taken to Portland today by U. S. Marshal Pace and will be transferred from there to Spokane for trial.

James B. Welch, deputy county clerk, is still at home with a bad cold and is not expected back at his desk before the first of the coming week. Meanwhile R. T. Brown, clerk, is handling the office alone.

Report of Home Service.
One hundred thirty-three families were served by the Home Service section of the Red Cross during the past month, according to a report just made by Miss Virginia Todd secretary. The sum of \$186.50 was given as financial assistance.

G. M. Rice, vice president of the First National Bank, returned last night from a vacation trip of two weeks which was spent motoring to the Willamette valley and to Portland. His son Richard accompanied him home, others of his family having remained in Portland. Mr. Rice drove to Eugene through the McKenzie Pass and is very much impressed with the scenic beauty of that route.

Band Concert Appreciated.
The weekly concert given by the Round-Up band last evening in the municipal band stand was very much appreciated by a large throng who came on foot and in machines to hear the hour's program. Favorable comment was heard on all sides regarding the improvement in the playing and all numbers in the program were well applauded.

Forest Supervisor Here.
R. M. Evans, forest supervisor for the Whitman National forest, was in the city today on his way to Baker, after visiting the John Day fire in the Whitman forest. He reports that the fire is still under control and says that while some of the fire fighters will be dismissed a force will be kept on hand for some time to watch the situation.

Indians Turned Over to Agent.
Jesse Pierce and Walter Williams, Indian boys accused of stealing \$20 from the showplace home on the reservation, have been turned over to Major Swartzlander, Indian agent, by the city authorities. Pierce will be handled by the local agency, while the Williams boy will be sent back to the Chemawa Indian school, whence he came.

Brother-in-law of Jack Keefe.
Dr. William Litterer, of Nashville, Tennessee, a brother-in-law of Jack Keefe, formerly of this city, has been awarded the distinguished service medal for inventing the most deadly gas used in the recent war. He is known as one of the greatest bacteriologists in the United States and invented, among other things, a serum for the treatment of trench fever. He is the brother of Mrs. Keefe, formerly Miss Rosalie Litterer. Mr. and Mrs. Keefe are making their home at Lyles, Tennessee, where Mr. Keefe is assistant superintendent of the Bon Air Coal and Iron Corporation.

The Rev. Lockwood on Committee.
The Rev. Alfred Lockwood, pastor of the Church of the Redeemer, has been named chairman for the missionary district of Eastern Oregon, in the national-wide campaign of the Protestant Episcopal church for an increased and strengthened membership and for funds with which to carry out the Episcopal church's share in the work of world evangelization being undertaken by the various Christian churches. The church has set a goal of \$20,000,000 to be secured at the end of the drive in November, but this is secondary to the desire of the church to arouse every member to a sense of obligation, say leaders for the campaign.

Portlander Sticks in Sand.
Jerry Bronaugh, Portland attorney and once president of the Mazamas, stopped over night in Pendleton, en route by machine to Yellowstone Park, accompanied by his son. Mr. Bronaugh was quite anxious to have fellow motorists in Portland know that there is sand on the road between Echo and Pendleton and that he was struggling to get his car free from it yesterday. He drove by way of The Dalles, Olex, Tons and Echo and made the trip here in two days. He advises his friends to take the trip slowly if they attempt it. Mr. Bronaugh and son left this morning for Walla Walla, Lewiston and Spokane.

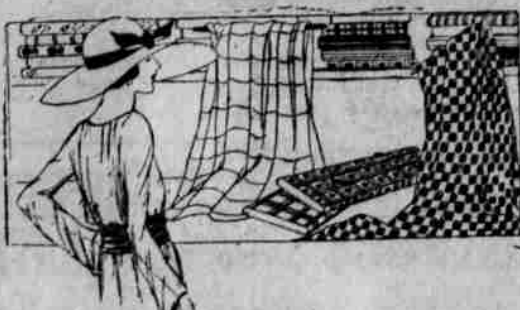
Failure to Support Charged.
