GERMANS CANNOT FLOCK TO ARGENTINE

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Fundamental national principles of the Argentine government will prevent any overwhelming swarm of German emigration to that country, according to Dr. Romulo S. Naon, Argentine minister to the United States. Naon's opinion was set forth in an interview with the New York correspondent of "La Prensa," of Buenos Aires, just before the South American diplomat sailed for home.

"I place little credence in the report that the German government will encourage emigration and settlement in Argentina of some five million Germans," said Naon. "The policy of Germany in the matter of emigration was always opposed to propaganda aiming at encouraging nationals to leave the country and settle abroad. I don't think such a policy will be modified in moments like the present. Today, more than ever before, Germany needs the cooperation and the assistance of all her children for the reconstruction of her economic and financial capacity."

"But even admitting that the German government or private German

corporations cherish such a plan, I think its execution is equally impossible, because fundamental reasons of national Argentine policy are opposed to it. Argentina cannot admit colonizations favored by foreign governments because this would be highly detrimental to the formation of national sentiment which needs to be fomented, especially in countries in process of formation.

"Noting that might even remotely cause the formation of a state within a state, could be viewed indifferently by the people of Argentina."

Possibly it's because they find the frothy scarves of maline and silk net much more cooling to the bare skin than mole and fox skin. Probably it's because they find them so becoming.

In white, navy, black and brown maline or silk net these newest neck scarves are finishing neck and neck as a winning hot weather fashion. Any color, however, is permissible and some of the vivid shades of green, cerise, purple and yellow add just the right color note to an all white costume. Often the maline is fashioned into a veritable scarf with the ends gathered together with a tassel as a finish, but more chic are the lengths in their virgin state, as 'twere, just as they are snipped off the bolt.

They are really the same maline lengths to which we have gone for many a season past to drape round our decollete shoulders on festive evenings. Now we have merely lifted them from bare shoulders and a ball room setting to bare throats and an outdoor environment. Now we wear them steadily around the fashionable cloak and our necks from a. m. until p. m. and adapt them as gracefully to the marts of trade as to the mazes of Terpsichore.

Cunning little close fitting draped turbans of the maline have been bob-

GERMAN SECURITIES BOTHER THE SWISS

GENEVA, Aug. 2.—Swiss bankers are expressing anxiety over the German National Assembly's proposal to require all German securities owned by Germans to be returned to Germany as large sums have been loaned by them on such collateral, particularly to members of the former royal house of the central powers.

The German government's proposed law would require all German securities belonging to Germans to be restamped. Unless the securities should be produced they would be repudiated. Germans during the war, it was said, deposited securities valued at about 7,000,000 in Switzerland.

Austria, which is said to have about \$2,000,000,000 in securities in Switzerland, is said to be contemplating similar action.

The Hohenzollern and Hapsburg families, it is said, would under these laws be compelled to declare their private fortunes, which, in the past, have been concealed carefully.

King George Urges British Sea Power Be Built Up Again

LONDON, Aug. 2.—King George told an audience in Guild hall today that one of the most important tasks

ahead of Great Britain is the restoration of her supremacy on the seas. He urged that the development of the merchant navy and of the ports be pursued with the utmost energy.

"A new era is opening," said the king. "The qualities that carried us to victory are needed for reconstruction if we are to reap the full benefits of peace."

King George pleaded for national thrift and for increased industrial production.

"Without these," he said, "we shall face depression and poverty and can not hope to maintain our pre-war commercial position."

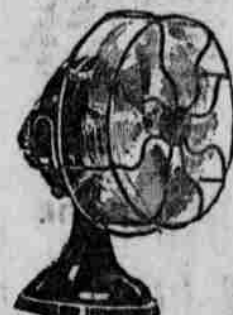

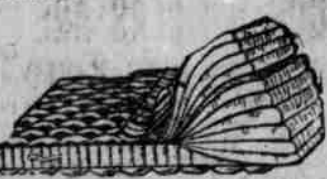

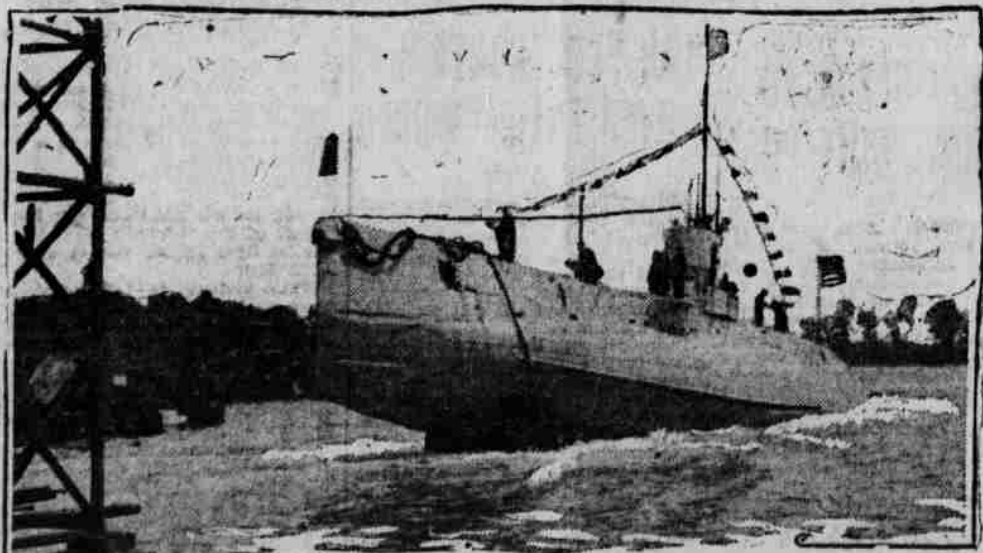
