GERMANY LONGING TO SEE FILM FAVORITES

After Five Years of Restrictions People Yearn for Mary Pickford

BERLIN, Aug. 6.—While Germany statesmen are discussing the peace terms another momentous question is heard among the people. It is: "When will we see Douglas Fairbanks, Charlie Chaplin and Mary Pickford?"

The director of the Universal Film company, which is the biggest moving picture producing and marketing concern in Europe, said today that efforts were being made to expedite shipments of American moving pictures, and that he expected shortly to be able to gratify the demand for movies showing the talents of the famous stars with whom the people here became familiar before the outbreak of the war.

"We have recently been severely criticized by the press for attempting to import foreign, and especially American, moving pictures," he declared. "In the first place it is necessary for us to buy foreign pictures for our theaters abroad. We have large interests in Serbia, Turkey, Bulgaria, the Balkans and the Scandinavian countries. The public in each of these countries wants pictures which they can understand, and being the largest firm on the continent, we feel it is our duty to meet this demand.

"We know that American films will be brought to Germany and we want to be in on the ground floor. For this reason we have placed extensive orders with American firms for first run photoplays showing luminous actors in their best roles. We are already negotiating many contracts through neutral countries, and it will be but a short time before we will be able to show American stars in our theaters here.

Awaiting American Agents.
"Before the outbreak of the world war, only about 35 per cent of films shown in Germany were produced here, but during the war it was impossible to get foreign films and therefore our production of films shown in this country reached 82 per cent of the total. But if German producers succeed in securing seven-fifty per cent of after the war trade in moving pictures, they can consider themselves exceedingly fortunate. Competition of American films will raise the standard of picture made here, also. The other fifty per cent of films produced here will probably find the largest market in America. We are waiting for American film agents to come to Berlin.

"The question that will probably present the greatest obstacle in the importing and exporting of moving pictures is that of the rate of exchange, but we hope that the Reichsbank will cooperate in overcoming this."

190 CHILDREN HAVE OUTING IN COUNTRY

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 6.—A contingent of 190 children departed today for the Children's Industrial Farm at Eureka, Mo., which is being maintained by a group of St. Louisans to give city children a country vacation. Fifteen mothers accompanied the children as attendants, and nine teachers will act as entertainers and play supervisors. The children are from the following organizations: Kingdom House, Markham Memorial, Open-Door Settlement, Riverside Mission, Boyle Center, Caroline Mission, Police Bureau Home Service, Section of the American Red Cross and the Children's Aid Society. Three similar groups of children had been sent previously.

MAN, 65, NAMED IN DIVORCE ACTION

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 6.—Henry C. Hall of No. 152 Madison avenue, New York city, sixty-five years old, is named as respondent in a di-

voice action brought by Edward P. Goldthwaite against Marie F. Goldthwaite. Hall is a second cousin of Mrs. Goldthwaite.

The suit is an aftermath of an application for a writ of habeas corpus made in 1914 by Goldthwaite to gain custody of his then twelve-year-old son. The writ was directed to John and Lucinda French, of Sullivan and Madison counties, parents of Mrs. Goldthwaite.

Mrs. Goldthwaite in her answer denies all wrongdoing.

ABOUT THE STARS

Canis Minor of the Lesser Dog.
According to Egyptian mythology, Canis Minor was the other dog which followed Orion the giant hunter in his many wanderings. It was noted for being a forerunner of the Greater Dog as it rose an hour earlier and gave notice of the approach of his companion. They were both observed as warning signs of the approach of an over-flow of the Nile.

The term "Dog Days" perhaps originated from the fact that about the 25th of July of each year Sirius, the greater dog rises at the same time as that of the sun and Procyon, the lesser dog a short time before, and they together with the fierce rays of the sun make the heat almost unbearable in low latitudes and cause dogs to go mad. It is well known however that the small amount of heat given out by and star is imperceptible when it reaches the earth. They also held to the theory that these stars also produced malignant fevers during July and August of each year.

Procyon is nine and a half light years from the earth and is approaching us at the rate of six miles per second, and emits eight times as much light as our sun.

There is an Arabian legend to the effect that Sirius and Procyon were sisters. Their brother Canopus, who seemed to be the proverbial black sheep of the family married Rigel, one of the chief stars in Orion and afterwards murdered her. This so enraged Sirius that she vowed to punish her brother, and started after him but by the time she had crossed the Milky Way he had disappeared down the southern horizon. Little Procyon put her hands over her face and wept bitterly at the disgrace and has never shown so brightly since.

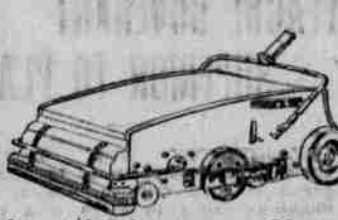
