Umatilla Wheat Crop.

According to J. A. Johns of Pendleton, who is a Portland visitor today, the recent rainless season has demonstrated that rain is not absolutely necessary to the production of a wheat crop in Umatilla county. He says farmers are now harvesting fields upon which not a drop of rain has fallen from the time of planting to the time of threshing, and the yield is satisfactory. The Umatilla wheat crop this year will pass the 3,500,000 bushel mark, an exceptional record for so dry a year.—Oregon Journal.

John McMurray, formerly swimming instructor at the Pendleton natatorium, has received his discharge after service as an ensign in the naval aviation, and has accepted a position with the grain department of Albers Brothers. Roscoe Agrees With Sherman.

Roscoe Vaughn, with three gold service stripes on his sleeve and 20 months' overseas experience, arrived from Camp Lewis Wednesday with an honorable discharge from Uncle Sam and a firm appreciation of General Sherman's vivid description of war. Vaughn was chief clerk at the Hotel Pendleton when he enlisted and expects to return to his former place. He will remain in Portland a few days visiting his mother.—Oregon Journal.

City Will Not Compromise.

Mrs. J. C. Crimmins of Prosser, who asks \$50 of the city because she fell and broke her arm on a city sidewalk, can bring suit for damages if she expects to recover anything from the city, City Attorney James A. Fee said today. Through her attorney, Mrs. Crimmins offered to accept \$200 for her injuries without going into court. The place in the sidewalk where she alleges she stumbled and fell is merely a rise and not an abrupt jump-off and hundreds of persons pass over it daily without injury.

Favor Special Session.

Cyril Brownell, representative from Umatilla county, and Roy Rittner, senator, favor the special session of legislature for the ratification of the suffrage amendment, according to letters sent to Governor Olcott in response to his request for an expression of opinion. Mr. Brownell waives per diem and mileage and is non-committal as to consideration of other legislation aside from the suffrage question. Senator Rittner favors the session in event it is delayed until after harvest. He also waives salary and per diem but refuses to confine legislation to the suffrage amendment. So far 24 representatives and 11 senators in the state have sent in their opinion to Governor Olcott.

The final hearing in the estate of Frank V. Pedro was today set for September 9.

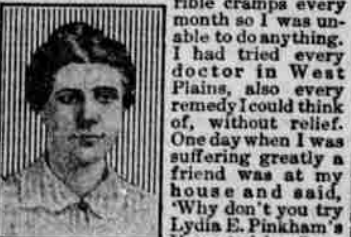
School Money Received.
