NAVY WILL RESUME PEACE TIME ROUTES

Pacific Fleet Goes to Hawaii After Visiting Seaports of West Coast.

Now that the war is ended the navy expects to take up its peace time routes, which includes cruises to various foreign ports. Each of the main divisions of both Atlantic and Pacific fleets will probably make at least one cruise each year to some point of interest abroad. There is a three fold reason for this—to give the ships practice in maneuvering and cruising in formation; to increase the prestige of the U. S. flag as an aid in foreign relations, trade, etc., and afford the personnel the opportunity of seeing foreign countries.

The Pacific fleet will go to Hawaii after visiting the principal west coast seaports, and all hands will be given a chance to eat poi, see the volcanoes, and inspect the islands to their hearts content.

The U. S. S. Idaho is now in Brazil, having taken the South American president home, and will stay in Rio de Janeiro a short time before coming to Los Angeles. A Flotilla of destroyers is visiting various ports in the Mediterranean, and a squadron of Eagle-boats is on active duty in northern Russia. The Atlantic fleet is now in home waters, after the winter and spring cruise to Cuba and various of the West Indian Islands.

ADMIRAL SIMS IS PRAISED
SYDNEY, Aug. 8.—Recognition of the service rendered by Rear-Admiral William S. Sims as commander of the American naval forces in the war zone was accorded by Lord

Jellicoe in a speech he delivered at Adelaide on a visit there recently. He said:

"While we were developing offensive measures against the submarine we were also developing a defensive or offensive system of conveying ships. Admiral Sims, for whom I have the highest regard and whose assistance was always valuable, looked upon the conveyance as an offensive system because if submarines could be attracted to the conveyance the destroyers had an opportunity of dealing with them. At first we had not sufficient cruisers and destroyers for convoys, but the success of the system was shown almost immediately we had."

INSANE SOLDIERS TO RECEIVE STATE CARE

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 11.—There are 150 insane soldiers in the various New York state hospitals. All practically suffered mental breakdowns

while in the service in France. Attorney General Newton today disclosed this fact in announcing that he is preparing applications to the supreme court for the appointment of committees to look after the property and money of the insane soldiers. It is estimated, according to Newton, that at least 1000 New York state soldiers will have been admitted to the insane asylums by the time demobilization is completed.

HOUSEHOLD

Thrill in Crackers.

While the war lasted a good many housewives refrained from using crackers or wafers—partly because they were expensive and often because the wheatless crackers or the crackers with only a small amount of wheat flour in their make up did not suit them. Perhaps we have not yet got back in the way of eating crackers so much as we did before. To be true, they are expensive, but not more so than other foods.

There is really more nourishment in wheat crackers than most persons suppose. In terms of the scientist, there are 1,923 calories of fuel in every pound of wheat crackers, as compared to 1,200 calories in bread, or 1,502 in dried white beans, which are well known for their high food values. To be sure, a pound of crackers would cost rather more than a pound of bread, still it is not an expensive form of food considering its high food value.

Crackers to be palatable should be served crisp and fresh. If you want to taste them at their best serve them this way with the salad course for your next "company" dinner: Butter them generously and place them in rows in a large roasting pan. Sprinkle them lightly with pepper—freshly ground, if you have your own pepper mill. About five minutes before you wish to serve them slip them into a good hot oven and leave them there until they have turned golden brown. With salmon mayonnaise salad these crackers served piping hot make a dish fit for a king.

Any good housewife, of course, knows the usefulness of broken crackers. They may be crushed into a powder with a rolling pin on the bread board and kept in a closely covered jar for use in frying croquettes, rice balls and other food, and for use in meat loaves and for the foundation of the filling of cooked stuffed vegetables—tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers.

Here is a satisfactory recipe for using crackers in place of potatoes with the meat course: Break the crackers and spread the pieces with butter, pepper and salt, and just a touch of mustard if you like the flavor. Put them into a baking dish and cover them with good rich milk, if possible half cream. Bake them in a moderate oven until brown and serve hot.

Here is a delicious cracker pudding—which calls for six large soda crackers, a quarter of a cupful of butter, a teaspoonful of sugar and the strained juice and a little of a grated rind from two lemons. These ingredients should be mixed together with enough boiling water to soften the crackers. While the water is soaking into the crackers beat up separately the yolk and whites of three eggs. Add a little sugar to the yolks if a very sweet pudding is desired. Briskly stir first the

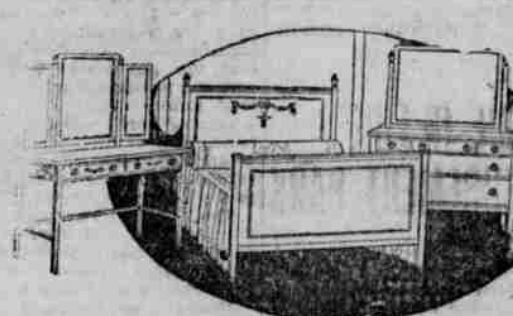

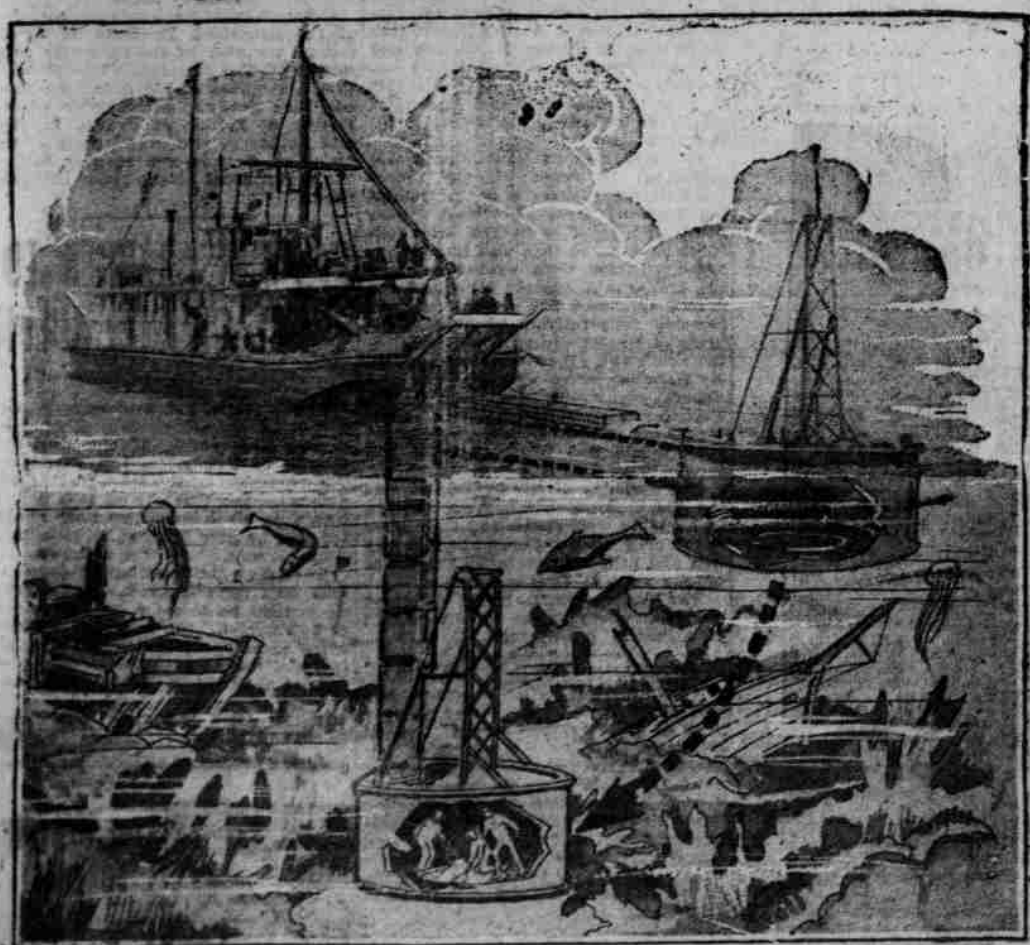

BUILT TO SALVAGE BILLIONS FROM OCEAN



BRIDGEPORT, CONN.—Walking dry-land in six fathoms of water on the floor of Long Island Sound, 50 men and women guests of Simon Lake, inventor of the submarine, tried out his new device that is intended to salvage from the floor of the ocean billions of dollars in gold and treasure sunk by submarine and wreck during the war. From the operating vessel a steel tube four and a quarter feet in diameter is connected to a balloon-shaped compartment. The observers crawl through the tube to this compartment and the tube is forced downward until the compartment rests on the floor of the ocean, or over a vessel to be salvaged and a metallic hatch is opened. Compressed air pumped in keeps seawater out. A suction equipment will lift 300 tons of coal an hour. The dotted line outlines the tube to the diving chamber and
